HCC breaks ground on Arts & Sciences Complex

On June 4, HCC held the groundbreaking ceremony for its new Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) building and Arts & Sciences Complex.

The event took place on the hill between the Science and Classroom Buildings, where the new STEM building will be built. HCC faculty and staff attended the event, as well as community leaders, state officials, and representatives from Cho Benn Holback + Associates, the architectural firm which designed the new buildings, and Hess Construction and Engineering Services, Inc., the

contractor who will build the new STEM building and complete the renovation on the Kepler Theater, as well as the Classroom and Science Buildings.

Attendees heard from HCC president Guy Altieri; former HCC board chair Carolyn Brooks; John Barr, president, Washington County Commissioners; Donald Munson, Md. State Senator; and Diane Cho from Cho Benn Holback + Associates.

During the lunch portion of the event, attendees also heard from HCC faculty members Judith Peisen, chair, mathematics and science division; Anthony

"Tony" Valente, instructor, industrial and energy technology; Joan Johnson, chair, English and humanities division; and Dawn Schoenberger, director, developmental education and adult literacy services (DEALS).

Construction on the building officially began in early July. When completed, the new STEM facility will provide approximately 65,000 square feet of laboratories, classrooms, and faculty offices in a five-story structure to be built between the existing Science and Classroom Buildings, which will also be renovated. The STEM building will contain green roof components, as well as solar, wind, and geothermal energy components.

Due to safety concerns, access to the construction site will only be open to those directly involved in the project. A perimeter fence has been put in around the construction area. Please respect the construction signs and remain outside the protective fencing.

A parking committee is working quickly to reconfigure parking on campus to accommodate the needs of our campus community during construction. Parts

Clemens publishes Civil War manuscript



Hagerstown Community College professor Thomas Clemens recently published "The Maryland Campaign of September 1862, Volume I: South Mountain," the first part of a two-volume historical, annotated manuscript that details one of the most famous campaigns of the Civil War.

The manuscript itself is the work of Ezra A. Carman, a Union colonel in the 13th New Jersey Infantry, who was later appointed as the historical expert to the Antietam Battlefield Board

in 1894. After the war, Carman wrote a 1,800-page manuscript on the Maryland Campaign, using firsthand accounts from war veterans and his own personal experience. In addition to eyewitness accounts, the manuscript includes maps and photos. A biographical dictionary will be included in Volume II, which is expected to be released in 2012.

According to Clemens, Carman's manuscript sat untouched for decades in the Library of Congress, referenced by historians but never published in its entirety. Clemens, recognized internationally as one of the foremost historians of the Maryland Campaign, began studying the campaign as part of his doctoral dissertation, and has spent the last 11 years editing and annotating

Carman's manuscript. The campaign itself Clemens has studied for more than 30 years.

"I see it as the pivotal campaign of the Civil War," says Clemens. "This is the campaign that made the Emancipation Proclamation possible and ended the Confederacy's hope of winning the war. It led to the Battle of Antietam, where more Americans were killed in a 24-hour period than in any other battle in Civil War history. Overall, it is incredibly compelling."

A professor of history and political science, Clemens earned his doctoral degree from George Mason University, where he studied under Maryland Campaign historian Joseph L. Harsh. He is a licensed tour guide at Antietam National Battlefield and is one of the founders of the Save Historic Antietam Foundation, Inc., where he currently serves as foundation president. Clemens has been teaching at HCC since 1978.

of K1 and K2 parking lots will be affected.

The STEM building project is scheduled to be completed in the fall 2011.

In June, HCC also began construction on a new student parking lot in the rear of campus near the Alumni Amphitheater. The new parking lot (parking lot N) will add an additional 450 spaces to campus for use by students and is expected to be completed in Aug. 2010.

Renovation on the Kepler Theater is scheduled to begin in late fall 2010.

This renovation includes an addition that will house a dance studio, gallery, classrooms, practice rooms, art rooms, and faculty offices.

The renovation space will also include expanded dressing rooms, a costume shop, and extended wardrobe storage. Renovation of the existing Science and Classroom Buildings will soon follow.

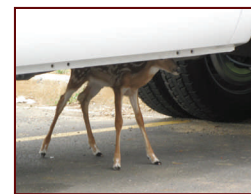

Paramedic instructor Austin Rinker retires

Austin Rinker, adjunct faculty member and Paramedic and Emergency Services (PES) Program Coordinator, will retire at the end of the 2010 summer semester. Rinker has been coordinating the HCC PES Program since 2004 and when he first took this position, there were only 11 first-year students and four second-year students. Since that time, the program has grown to include 17 first-year students and 11 second-year students. According to Health Sciences Director Angie Stoops, Rinker has worked

diligently to improve second-year student retention and encourage further growth of the program.

"Austin understands the value of collaborative relationships and works well both within and outside the institution," says Stoops. "He has played an instrumental role as one of the coordinators of the CREAS training event that is held every year and he provides BLS recertification training for our health sciences and nursing faculty."

Rinker received his AA degree in law enforcement from Hagerstown Junior

College and went on to earn a BS degree in criminal justice from the University of Baltimore, a second BS degree in biology/zoology from Frostburg State University, and a MS degree in biomedical science from Hood College. In addition to being an adjunct instructor and program coordinator at HCC, Rinker also works as a research biologist for the National Institutes of Health/Allergy and Infectious Diseases/Laboratory of Immunology, Lymphocyte Biology Section.

Rinker has also distinguished himself in academic and professional circles through the publication of various health science articles and appointments to a variety of groups and associations including affiliate faculty for Md. Basic Trauma Life Support, University of Maryland Baltimore campus; regional faculty for the American Heart Association; basic life support and emergency cardiac care committee, American Heart Association; and a focus group member for the U.S. Department of Justice National DNA Initiative: Law Enforcement Training

Development.

"You can find Austin at the College many weekends, helping students prepare for their skills testing or teaching," says Stoops. "His scope of knowledge is broad and he loves to share that knowledge. Austin has a wonderful way of delivering information, using humor and stories; he adeptly gets the message across. We will miss Austin in the Health Sciences Division. He is one of those people who will always be here, like a warm spirit."

For HCC students, Rinker's teaching has been invaluable and he has often been praised by students and faculty alike for the passion he displays in student learning.

"He [Rinker] went above and beyond teaching this course," said one HCC student on an end-of-the-year evaluation. "He incorporated not only the textbook, but real-life examples in order to better our knowledge. EMT is a class that cannot be taught by watching—you have to have hands-on and that was accomplished to the maximum degree possible. I feel like I'm as prepared as possible to go into the field."



TIC client wins prestigious incubator award

HCC recently announced that B & D Consulting, Inc., one of many technology firms developing in the Technical Innovation Center (TIC), has won the award for Best Technology Services Company in Maryland at the Tenth Annual Maryland Incubator Company of the Year Awards.

Founded in 2004 by Jeff Bearden, B & D Consulting, Inc. is a U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) certified 8(a) disadvantaged business that provides network engineering, business intelligence, cyber security/risk management, and information assurance services to

government agencies and Fortune 500 firms. B & D Consulting, Inc. first joined HCC's Technical Innovation Center in 2008.

"I expected B & D to win the award because of Jeff's laser-like focus on B & D's core mission and his willingness to develop the skill sets of the firm's employees," says Chris Marschner, TIC director. "The TIC has had several other firms selected as finalists but B & D Consulting, Inc. is the first client to take top prize."

The Incubator Company of the Year Awards are held annually as part of a joint effort led by Saul

Ewing, RSM McGladery, Maryland's Department of Business and Economic Development and the Maryland Technology Development Corp (TEDCO), and serve to recognize the best of Maryland's emerging technology firms. The selection committee is comprised of senior executives at state research, banking, venture capital, university, and government institutions. B & D Consulting, Inc. placed first among hundreds of nominations submitted by incubators from across the state.

"Maryland's incubators are home to some of the most technically advanced,

early-stage firms in the nation. Only the elite reach the finalist stage," says Marschner.

"To win, the firm must demonstrate that it alone is best in its class." The Technical Innovation Center at Hagerstown Community College is the region's largest and most comprehensive business incubator. It is a self-sustaining economic development effort that fosters the growth of new and expanding businesses by providing access to advanced technologies, business development resources, and collaborative opportunities.

Retirees were honored at a special reception in The Merle S. Elliott Continuing Education and Conference Center on Mon., May 17. Dr. Guy Altieri

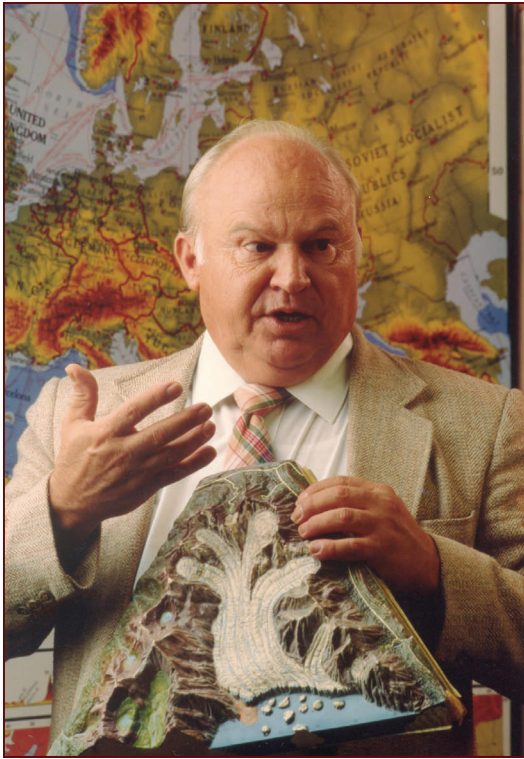
served as master of ceremonies and Anna Barker, vice-president, administration and finance; Frances Cade,

HCC says farewell to Hagerstown Junior College professor Harold Boyer

In Memoriam



Two weeks after HCC said farewell to its first president, Atlee Kepler, the College also said goodbye to one of its long-time professors, Harold Boyer, who passed away on May 13, 2010. He was 74 years old.

Boyer was born on May 2, 1936 in Maugansville, Md. He graduated from Hagerstown High School in 1954 and received his AA degree from Hagerstown Junior College in 1956. He received his BA and MA degrees from George Peabody College for Teachers of Vanderbilt University.

Boyer taught at HCC, then Hagerstown Junior

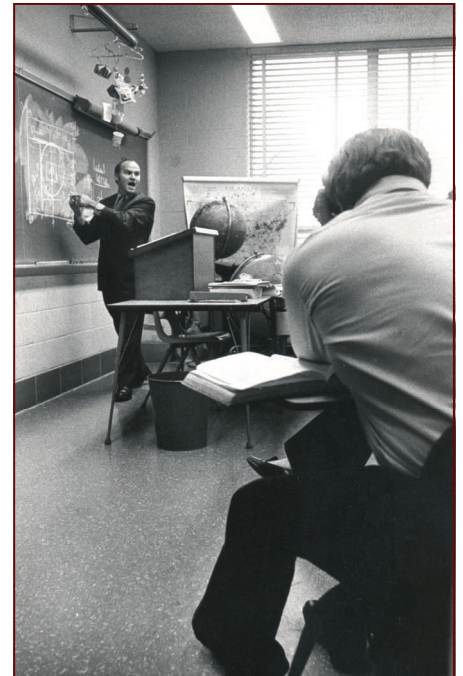
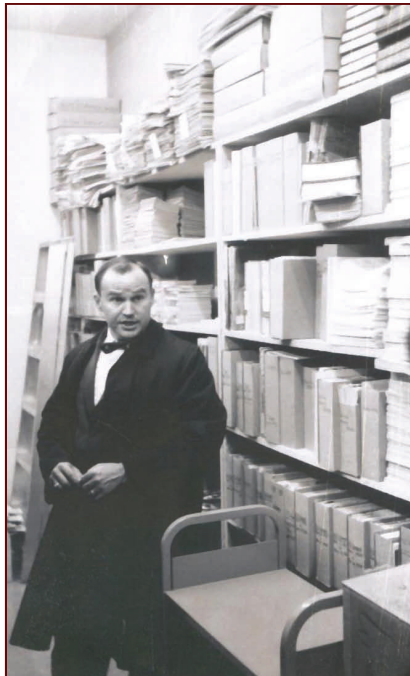
College, for 32 years before retiring in 1994.

“I was on all three campuses,” said Boyer in a 2006 interview for HCC’s 60th Anniversary. “I was one of the rare birds who went to the Junior College when it was at Hagerstown High School and I had one semester at the South High campus and then I came here as a professor in 1962.”

Boyer was a favorite among students, fellow faculty, and staff and even after his retirement, was a frequent visitor to campus. He was named Professor Emeritus in 1994.
