
Mikulski announces broadband initiative at HCC



On Mon, Sept. 20, U.S. Sen. Barbara Mikulski (D-Md.) and Md. Lt. Governor Anthony Brown held a special press conference to announce a \$115 million dollar federal grant awarded to Maryland by the U.S.

Department of Commerce. The press conference was held in the Elliott Center, located on the upper level of the Career Programs Building on HCC's main campus.

The primary purpose of the grant is to create jobs, improve educational opportunities for state residents, and improve both health care delivery and public safety. According to a press release distributed by Mikulski's office prior to the event, the grant will link seven anchor institutions, including HCC, in Washington County alone. Mikulski estimated that the project should begin within the next 18 months.



HCC receives financial gift from the Fletcher Foundation

HCC was recently awarded a \$385,000 grant from the Alice Virginia and David W. Fletcher Foundation for the purpose of creating a faculty development center. The goal of the center is to provide resources that will strengthen the teaching skills of new and part-time faculty, and ultimately, increase the academic success of students in HCC's credit programs.

"We frequently have new and adjunct faculty who come to campus with strong knowledge in their fields of expertise, but limited formal teaching experience," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "We have had the dream of creating a faculty development center for years, but never had the resources to make it happen. Now, thanks to the generosity of the Fletcher Foundation, we will be able to actively enhance the quality of instruction on our campus by exposing new faculty to various teaching resources and connecting

them with many of our experienced faculty, in a structured setting provided through the creation of this center."

Programs offered through the Fletcher Faculty Development Center will focus on some of the basic elements of good teaching, which include effective course development, effective teaching practices, and class/course management. Seasoned full-time faculty, division chairs and directors will be involved in the center by providing teacher-centered guidance and training to help new faculty become more effective in the classrooms, labs, and clinical settings where they are assigned to teach.

"Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher believed that good teachers opened doors of opportunity that allowed students to achieve their goals and realize their dreams," said William P. Young Jr., executive director of the foundation. "The Fletcher Foundation is pleased to partner

with HCC to provide this resource so new and adjunct faculty can create innovative and exciting learning opportunities to help HCC's students respond creatively to the demands of a global economy."

The mission of the Fletcher Foundation is to provide aid and encouragement to charitable organizations which (I) carry on their activities and work principally in Washington County, Md., and help worthy individuals (a) continue their education, (b) establish themselves in business, (c) overcome adversities, or (d) maintain or support themselves or their families; and (2) enhance the quality of life in Washington County, Maryland.

Cardin awards \$1.8 million dollar AET grant to HCC



On Aug. 2, U.S. Senator Benjamin L. Cardin (D-MD) visited the campus of Hagerstown Community College to present a ceremonial check for \$1.8 million as part of a grant from the U.S. Department of Labor to support HCC's alternative energy technology program.

"This funding will allow us to greatly expand our alternative energy program," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "During the

next three years, we anticipate that through credit and non-credit courses in this area, we will be able to train 675 students, who will be able to take these skills and get good jobs in this growing industry." HCC received the money as part of a the U.S. Department of Labor Community-Based Job Training grant to expand training in clean energy technology. HCC's credit-based program in alternative energy

Technology includes an associate degree as well as certificates in solar/wind energy and geothermal energy. Non-credit courses will also be offered as a way to allow students to explore areas in this field or add to their existing job skills.

"Jobs are the key to our economic recovery and this job training grant for the U.S. Department of Labor will make it easier for residents of Washington County to obtain the training they need to get jobs in new and emerging industries," said Senator Cardin.

HCC receives \$1.1 million dollar TRIO Grant from Dept. of Education

HCC was recently awarded a five-year grant totaling \$1.1 million from the U.S. Department of Education Student Support Services (SSS) TRIO Program.

The goal of this program is to increase retention, graduation, and transfer rates of first-generation college students, low-income students, and students with documented disabilities, who demonstrate academic need.

"We are very pleased that this federal grant will allow us the opportunity to provide increased customized assistance so that more students can realize their substantial academic success potential," said Dr. Guy Altieri, HCC president. "Program data has shown that students in an SSS

program are twice as likely to remain in college students than from similar backgrounds who did not participate."

SSS students at HCC will receive academic tutoring, counseling services, financial and economic literacy training, and assistance in determining career and academic goals, with an emphasis on transfer to a four-year college. A limited number of SSS students will be eligible for grants through the program. All SSS students will be provided the opportunity to visit four-year colleges, attend cultural events, and participate in workshops regarding life and academic skills.

The history of TRIO began with Upward Bound, which emerged out of the

Economic Opportunity Act of 1964. In 1965, Talent Search, the second outreach program, was created as part of the Higher Education Act. In 1968, Student Support Services became the third in a series of educational opportunity programs. By the late 1960s, the term "TRIO" was coined to describe these federal programs. TRIO is now a series of eight programs designed to help students progress through the academic pipeline from middle school to postbaccalaureate programs. More than 1,200 colleges, universities, and agencies offer TRIO programs in America.

HCC's grant officially began Sept. I.

From the classroom to the field...

HCC dental assisting student learns about dental procedures first-hand



Before graduating from the dental assisting program in June, Hagerstown Community College student Allison Donovan, of Hagerstown, was able to experience what few dental assisting students do: dental procedures being performed live in the operating room.

As part of their training, HCC students in the dental assisting program must complete seven credits of externship time at a clinical facility. For Donovan, age 20, the two weeks she spent working with Harvey Levy at the Dr. Harvey

Levy & Associates, PC, a dental facility in Frederick, not only helped her practice the skills she had learned in the classroom, but also provided her with an opportunity to observe three medical cases, two of which involved lifethreatening infections in the mouth.

"I volunteered to go with them," said Donovan. "When Dr. Levy and his assistant were preparing to leave, I told them to pack me in their bag as well and I'm so glad I did: watching Dr. Levy perform those

procedures and help those patients was amazing."

According to Donovan, Levy specializes in working with special needs patients, including "fear" patients who've often had traumatic experiences with previous dentists. "It was so rewarding," says Donovan. "I've never been uncomfortable around people with special needs and getting to help them-seeing how it's done and what precautions need to be taken in order to really work with themit was a great experience."

Levy is one of more than 15 dentists in the tri-state area that is providing externships for HCC's dental assisting students. According to Theresa Marks, HCC instructor, dental assisting/ hygiene and Donovan's teacher, Levy was chosen specifically because of his expertise with special needs patients and his devotion to educating students and the public. "He opened up this opportunity for us here at the College,' says Marks. "Next year, we will be placing more students in his facility so that they can be exposed to a

different part of dentistry they might not normally see."

For Donovan, her experience at Levy's practice confirmed that she had chosen the right career path and within weeks of graduating from HCC's program, she'd obtained a job at a dental care facility in Germantown, Md. When asked about the future, Donovan replied that she plans to continue as a dental assistant. "As a dental assistant, you get to experience so many things, so many different situations that you wouldn't see if you were just a hygienist. This is exactly where I want to be."



In the labs...



College students conduct cancer research in the TIC



College students Paul Park and Tae-Ho Rho have spent their summer breaks helping Ji Hoon Lee, Ph.D., conduct experimental research to develop new technology to diagnose and monitor various diseases such as cancer, cardiac aliments, cancer, and infectious diseases. Working with several scientists of Oak Ridge National Laboratory, two faculty members from Clemson University's Department of Environmental Engineering and Earth Science, and John Newby, M.D., of

Washington County Health System, Lee expects to involve the students in the project for the next three years during their summer and winter breaks.

"My interns are developing novel analytical methods for simultaneously quantifying various enzymes in human blood," said Lee, CEO of Luminescent MD, a biotech research firm in the Technical Innovation Center at HCC. "I expect that the innovative technology will be applied to simultaneously sense trace level of multiple tumor markers.

The new methods will be applied for a U.S. patent. Based on the research, they will also get opportunities to present their research at conferences such as ACS (American Chemical Society) Meeting and AACC (American Association for Clinical Chemistry) Annual Meeting."

The project involves the development of microfluidic devices known as Lab-On-A-Chip that will aid in the detection of specific tumor markers present in a person's blood, helping scientists diagnose certain types of cancer such as prostate, breast, liver, stomach, and thyroid.

"I'm surprised at how the simplest test can provide data that can lead to bigger conclusions than you originally thought possible," said Park, who will begin his freshman year at Johns Hopkins University this fall.

"It's been really interesting to have the chance to get hands-on experience."

Park, of Potomac, Md., will study chemical and biomolecular engineering at JHU and ultimately plans to enter medical school.

Rho, of Bethesda, Md., will enter his sophomore year at Brown University, where he is studying biochemistry. He also plans to enter medical school.

"This internship has been very exciting because of the potential it offers," said Rho. "The theory is complicated, but the research is simple and straight forward. Having done actual research is crucial to getting into medical school."

Lee is a former faculty member in the Department of Biological Sciences at Clemson University. He is currently pursuing grant funding for this project through the U.S. Department of Defense with his collaborators.



Biotech Summer Institute wraps up its second year



HCC's annual Biotechnology Summer Institute was held from June 14 through Aug. 9, 2010. Like last year, the Institute featured two sessions: one for high school science teachers and one for high school students. The Biotech Summer Institute is funded by a grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF). The national rant allows for students and teachers from outside Washington County to apply to take part in the summer program.

Overall, 13 science teachers participated including three from private schools, one from Thailand, and two from W. Va. schools. During the student portion of the institute, 20 high school students participated. The students took Biotechnology 101 and Biology 101 (including the lab) over eight weeks and earned seven science credits. The students also went on a variety of field trips and traveled to such places as the National Institutes of Health (NIH), MedImmune, Human Genome Sciences (HGS), and the J. Craig Venter Institute.

Clemens to speak at Washington County Museum on Oct. 10



HCC professor and Civil War historian Thomas Clemens will give a Civil War lecture on Sun., Oct. 10, beginning at 2:30 p.m., at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts in Hagerstown.

Clemens' presentation will focus on the work of Ezra A. Carman, a Union colonel in the 13th New Jersey Infantry, who was later appointed as the historical expert to the Antietam Battle-field Board in 1894. After the war, Carman wrote a 1,800-page manuscript on the Maryland Campaign, using firsthand accounts from war veterans and his own personal experience. In addition to eyewitness

accounts, the manuscript includes maps and photos.

According to Clemens, Carman's manuscript sat untouched for decades in the Library of Congress, referenced by historians but never published in its entirety. Clemens, recognized internationally as one of the foremost historians of the Maryland Campaign, began studying the campaign as part of his doctoral dissertation, and

has spent the last II years editing and annotating Carman's manuscript. He recently published an annotated version of the first part of Carman's manuscript, "The Maryland Campaign of September 1862, Volume I: South Mountain," earlier this summer.

Clemens' presentation will be given in conjunction with the exhibition, "Circuit of the Summer Hills: Mourning the Losses of the Civil War," which opened in Jan. 2010. Copies of his book will be available for purchase in the museum gift shop and Clemens will sign copies of his book after the lecture. A professor of history and political science, Clemens earned his doctoral degree


from George Mason University, where he studied under Maryland Campaign historian Highway in Hagerstown. Joseph L. Harsh. He is a licensed tour guide at Antietam National Battlefield and is one of the founders of the Save Historic Antietam Foundation, Inc., where he currently serves as foundation president. Clemens has been teaching at HCC since 1978.

Additional talk on Sept. 23

Clemens will also be addressing the Hagerstown Civil War Round Table on Thurs., Sept. 23, at 7 p.m., where he will once again speak on topic of the Carman papers. The lecture will be held at the Hagerstown Hotel and Convention Center on Dual Highway in Hagerstown.


