HCC float takes second in annual Mummers Parade



For the second year, HCC won one of the top prizes at the annual Alsatia Mummers Parade, taking home second place in the Schools Division. The first place winner was the Smithsburg/Clear Spring FFA and the third place winner was Springfield Middle School.

The creation and building of the HCC float was thanks to the combined efforts and hard work of multiple groups across campus, including commercial vehicle transportation, alternative energy technology, biotechnology, nursing, radiography, advising, Re-prographics, maintenance and grounds, the public information office, student activities, and the Student Government Association.

This year, the theme of the HCC float focused on career programs including

biotechnology, nursing, radiography, education, and alternative energy technology.

To represent biotechnology, Biotech Advisor/Recruiter Mylyhn Nguyen provided scientific instruments, colored solutions, test tubes, and other equipment to simulate a biotechnology lab on the float. Public Information Director Beth Stull, dressed in a lab coat, goggles, and gloves posed with the equipment. Stull filled in for an HCC biotech student who was unable to make the event.

To represent nursing, Simulation Lab Assistant Matt Dorsey and the Nursing Division provided a nursing stretcher and an IV. Nursing student Angie Ebersole, dressed in her nursing scrubs, attended her father, Wayne, who

posed as the patient. She was joined by radiography student Derek Mills, who was also dressed in his rad tech scrubs to represent the radiography program.

To represent education, SGA Vice-President Maggie Stone posed as a teacher at and taught two young children: Kirsten Barnhart, the daughter of Student Activities Coordinator Heather Barnhart, and Hannah Stull, the daughter of Public Information Director Beth Stull.

To represent alternative energy technology, AET instructor Tony Valente and his students built a small, energy-friendly house that featured solar panels and a wind turbine. They also added a "cherry-picker," in which HCC student Jamie Wisz rode sporting her HCC hardhat. HCC student Cody Anderson posed next to the house where he "worked" on solar panels attached to the roof. Anderson also wore his HCC hardhat. Small trees were added to give the illusion that the AET technicians were working at a great height as they repaired the solar panels and wind turbine.

Other float riders included Tim Barger, Fabiola Viteri, and Bill Miller. The

The Hagerstown Community College Foundation, Inc. will host a reception, show, and sale of paintings by R. Benjamin Jones on Fri., Nov. 19 and Sat., Nov. 20, in the Kepler Theater. Event times are 5 to 9 p.m. on Friday and 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday.

This year's show will feature local scenes of the Washington County countryside, as well as the downtown arts and entertainment district in Hagerstown. The show will also include Jones' renowned portraits, landscapes, still-lives, and animal paintings. A portion of the proceeds will benefit HCC and its students.

A retrospective of Jones' work will be on display at the Washington County Museum of Fine Arts in Hagerstown in May 2011.

HCC Alternative Energy Program gets MHEC approval

A new associate degree and two certificates in Alternative Energy Technology at HCC have been approved by the Maryland Higher Education Commission and received statewide designation for Maryland public community colleges, which allows out-of-county students to pay in-county tuition rates for these programs.

HCC offers an associate of applied science degree in Alternative Energy Technology and related certificates in Geothermal Energy Installation/Service and

Solar/Wind Energy Installation/Service. The goal of these programs is to prepare students to enter industrial, commercial, and residential settings in the growing areas of renewable energy (solar, wind, and geothermal) technologies.

HCC is also offering non-credit two-hour information sessions in alternative energy technology. These include Introduction to Geothermal Technology for HVAC Technicians on Nov. 6, from 9 to 11 a.m.; and The ABCs of Alternative Energy on Nov. 13,

from 9 to 11 a.m.

The Industrial Technology degree and certificate and Facilities Maintenance Technology certificate at HCC have also been designated as statewide programs, giving out-of-county students the same opportunity to pay in-county tuition rates for these programs.

also to the public.

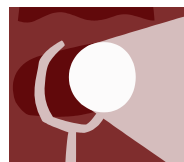

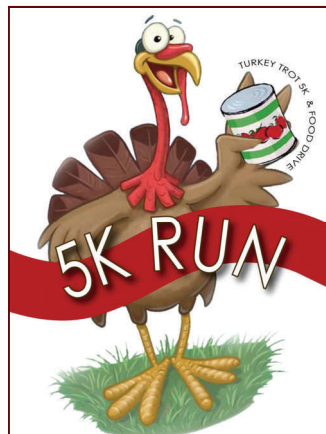

HCC nursing students to receive Red Cross disaster training



Nursing students at Hagerstown Community College will participate in "Sheltering and Disaster Health for Nursing Students," a pilot study sponsored by the American Red Cross that is intended to prepare students to volunteer with the Washington County Chapter of the Red Cross in the event of a disaster.

"With their strong commitment to community service, our nursing students want to be ready to respond should disaster strike close to home," says Teresa Weedon, HCC instructor, nursing, who will serve as lead coordinator for the HCC pilot. "This workshop

will prepare them to volunteer in Red Cross disaster settings."

According to Weedon, the pilot will be given four times between November and June and will involve three registered nurse (RN) classes and one practical nurse class (LPN). The workshop will introduce students to the role of a Red Cross Disaster Health Services volunteer; prepare students to assess the needs of disaster clients and provide needed assistance; and provide strategies for working with vulnerable or at-risk populations.

"The idea behind the pilot is to take a two-day course and reduce it to a four-hour workshop," says Weedon. "The benefit to nursing students is that they not only receive disaster preparation, but this exercise will help them practice priority setting and triage in a real-world scenario. Priority setting, delegation, and assessment skills are an area of increasing focus on the 2010 NCLEX exam, which all nursing students are required to take in order to become a registered or licensed practical nurse.

This workshop will help enhance student success in this area."

According to the Red Cross, disaster preparedness is a critical component in the professional development of nursing students. The American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN) requires emergency preparedness/disaster management content in all accredited baccalaureate nursing programs. "Sheltering and Disaster Health for Nursing Students" meets AACN requirements and nursing students who participate in the pilot will be better prepared should they decide to transfer to a four-year university after graduating from HCC.

HCC is one of 12 U.S. nursing schools participating in the American Red Cross National Student Nurse Program pilot study and is the only school in Maryland to be chosen. If the pilot study at HCC and other U.S. nursing schools is successful, the disaster training will be recommended as a basic part of nursing education for all nursing students.

HCC kicks off Commission on the Future in September

HCC held its official kickoff for the Commission on the Future of HCC on Thurs., Sept. 23, at 3 p.m., in the Elliot Center. The group, comprised of community members, alumni, students, faculty members, and HCC administrators, will work through the end of this school year to identify local higher education needs and share recommendations to help HCC shape its long-range strategic plan.

“As the community’s college, it’s imperative that we work with local organizations and citizens to identify the most significant needs of the community,” said HCC President Guy Altieri. “The work of this commission will serve as a valuable tool in helping us plan for continued success in addressing HCC’s educational mission, vision, and values in serving the local community.”

The commission will help identify community educational needs, assess HCC’s responsiveness, and suggest improvements for the mission and service of the college. Commission members

will be asked to examine the challenges and opportunities that HCC is expected to face in the next five years. The end goal is to have the commission set forth recommendations to guide HCC in planning for and using its resources to best serve the community.

Carolyn Brooks, immediate past chair of the HCC Board of Trustees and current board member, and John League, editor and publisher of The Herald-Mail are serving as the co-chairs of the commission. Four study groups within the commission will allow the group to examine the college by specific areas.

The Student and Student Affairs Study Group is co-chaired by Donna Rudy, HCC dean of student affairs, and David Engle, director of the Washington County Department of Social Services. Group members include Sila Bartel, representing the Hispanic community; Leon Brumback, HCC Foundation; Maureen Grove, Girls Inc.; Joan Johnson, HCC faculty; Carol Kreykenbohm-

Barnhart, Washington County Public Schools; and John Little, HCC’s Student Government Association.

The Programs and Educational Support Study Group is co-chaired by Judith Oleks, HCC vice president of academic affairs, and Cassandra Latimer, director of public affairs and communications at Citicorp. Group members include Donna Hanlin, WCPS; Joe Kroboth, Washington County government; Rebecca Massie Lane, Washington County Museum of Fine Arts; Sean Maher, HCC faculty; Dori Nipps, Pen-Mar Development Corporation; Theresa Shank, dean of HCC’s Continuing Education and Community Services Division; and Maggie Stone, HCC SGA.

The Finances, Facilities, Human Resources, and Technology Support Study Group is co-chaired by Anna Barker, HCC vice president of administration and finance, and Tom Newcomer, president of R. Bruce Carson. Group members include Sam Cool, IPlanet Technologies; John

Itell, Albright, Crumbacker, Moul & Itell; Phil Kelly, Millennium 3 Energy; Joe Marschner, HCC faculty; Matthew Vich, HCC SGA; and Jim Ward, D.M. Bowman.

The Effectiveness and Quality Assurance Study Group is co-chaired by Barbara Macht, HCC dean of planning and institutional effectiveness, and Earl Stoner, Washington County health officer. Group members include Dale Bannon, WCPS; Tracy Barlup, Longmeadow Animal Hospital; Mary Anne Burke, Washington County Arts Council; Rebecca Lake, HCC SGA; Kathy Maher, Hagers-town government; and Tony Valente, HCC faculty.

The commission is expected to complete its work by April 2011. Following review by the HCC board of trustees and input from HCC faculty and staff, the final recommendations will be incorporated into HCC’s Strategic Plan 2016, which will be implemented beginning in September of 2012.

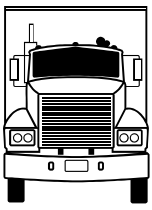
Old boiler removed from central plant



HCC recently removed an aging Kewanee 400 h.p. boiler that was initially installed in the central utility plant in 1966. The original boiler was a dual-fire boiler that had the option to burn either oil or natural gas, although fuel oil tanks were removed from the HCC campus several years ago. When the Kewanee boiler was first manufactured, fuel oil was less expensive and boiler efficiencies were less important, running around 65 percent.

The Kewanee boiler has been repaired numerous times and was in need of another major repair in order to make it safe and operational. Two or possibly three smaller, high-efficiency replacement boilers will be designed in series to replace the large Kewanee boiler and are expected to provide a 95% efficiency rate. The series boilers will be staged as needed depending on outside temperatures. In moderate temperature conditions such as spring or fall, only one small boiler may be needed to heat the buildings. This will result in a significant savings of energy dollars.

HCC graduates two in Commercial Vehicle Transportation Management Program



HCC recently graduated two students in its Commercial Vehicle Transportation (CVT) management program. Graduates included John Cavey, of Hancock, and Lloyd Steinkamp, of Martinsburg, W.Va.

"The CVT Management Program is designed for students who want to work in the movement of raw material and freight to manufacturing facilities," says Cavey, who is also the coordinator of HCC's Commercial Vehicle

Transportation or truck-driving program. "I took the CVT management course so that I could better prepare our students for the expectations and challenges they will encounter along the way. This way I can give them a first-hand view as to how the program is structured. After completing the program, students will be better prepared for entry-level jobs such as distribution managers, dispatchers, traffic managers, and warehouse

supervisors."

Graduates were recognized on Aug. 28 at the summer Dot Foods, Inc. company picnic. According to Margaret Spivey, director, technology and computer studies division at HCC, Dot Foods, Inc. is a valued partner of HCC's CVT Program.

"In addition to being an active recruiter for truck driving students after they complete HCC's program, Dot Foods is also an important member of the CVT Advisory Committee. Our professional studies offerings are further enhanced by the quality instruction offered by two Dot Foods employees that serve as adjunct faculty at the College," says Spivey. "The education that our students receive from transportation industry professionals like those at Dots Foods is perhaps the greatest benefit of our relationship with this company and other local trucking firms."

Currently, HCC offers an A.A.S. degree in

Commercial Transportation Administration and two certificates in Commercial Transportation Management and Commercial Vehicle Transportation Specialist. HCC's CVT program began in 1995 and more than 1,000 students have graduated from the program since its inception.

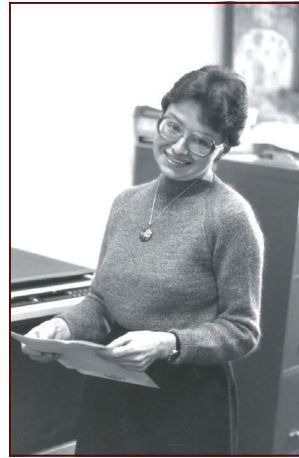

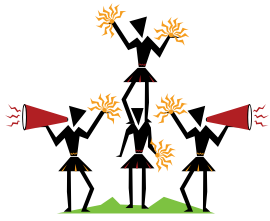
