Course/Program Title: Intermediate Sign Language ASL 102

Course/Program Team: Kaye Peacock

This course expands upon the basic competencies and proficiencies of communication and cultural analysis that were introduced in ASL 101.

The course is a continuation of ASL I. It is designed to develop further communication competency in ASL above the basic level. Students will be exposed to sentence types, non-manual behaviors, time, pronominalization, subjects and objects, classifiers, locatives, pluralization, temporal and distributional aspects. It will also help students develop a visual and gestural foundation through meaningful interactive activities. It also will cover the basic aspects of ASL, both grammatically and functionally. Some information about the Deaf community and its culture will be featured throughout the course.

Expected Learning Outcomes: The goals of this course are to develop competency in:

- giving directions
- describing others
- making requests
- talking about family and occupations
- attributing qualities to others
- telling about routines

The goal of classroom activities is to provide the greatest educational benefit to all students. Class participants should expect and provide mutual respect and consideration in words and actions.
