- (1) Students in the course are provided with a topic and required to create a 500 word (about 2 pages given the format described below) argument position essay either in favor of or opposing the issue, and defending that stance (Outcomes 1 and 2).
- (2) Students complete three examinations during the semester (Outcome 1)
- (3) Students complete a research paper (minimum of 6 pages) and presentation (Outcomes 1 and 2)
- (4) A "Crime Group" Presentation is a course requirement. Using data from the FBI's Uniform Crime Report, the following is covered in the project:
 - 1) A legal description of the crime the UCR definition and how the State of Maryland defines that particular offense
 - 2) Statistics regarding that particular offense from 2000 to 2009 at the national level (UCR), State of Maryland, Washington County and finally City of Hagerstown
 - 3) Information covering how media presents these types of offenses, any noteworthy current events or historical events related to this crime
 - 4) A synopsis (suggestions/recommendations) on crime prevention methods/techniques to reduce likelihood of becoming a victim (Outcomes 1 and 2)
