Haddock Martenot coproduces conservation film



Audra Haddock Martenot, an adjunct faculty member at Hagerstown Community College, has teamed up with Rob Owens, an independent filmmaker and the president and owner of Eagle Rock Productions, to co-produce the independent film, "One With Life."

"One With Life," provides an intimate look at a growing, worldwide movement that emphasizes the need for people to connect with nature, with a special emphasis on the importance of engaging and encouraging children to explore the great outdoors.

"Today, the health of children is a great issue and the idea is to encourage

them to get back to nature, to get away from the television and go play outside," says Martenot. "In their hearts, everybody knows that humans and nature are connected but people get busy and they forget. This film is another step to try to make

people aware of the importance of nature: We can't exist without it and it can't exist without us. It's a way to try to bridge the gaps between nature and ourselves."

According to Martenot, the film details some of the significant efforts that have taken place since the first Dialogue on Children and Nature was held at the National Conservation Training Center (NCTC) in 2006 and follows the movement up through June 10, 2010. Additional footage will be added in the coming months and the final version of the film is expected to be released in spring 2011 through the Friends of the NCTC and the U.S. Department of the Interior.

In Nov. 2010, a short, 10-minute version of the film debuted at the American Conservation Film Festival in Shepherdstown, W.Va. The American Conservation Film Festival is held every year to promote film and art that educates and inspires people to become engaged in conservation.

"It feels good to be involved in this project – to be involved in something that's bigger than you," says Martenot. "It's a beautiful thing knowing that whatever is done, it's going to sustain, it's going to last, and it's not going to stop."

Martenot has been teaching at HCC since 1997 and teaches classes in both the art and graphic design disciplines including photography, Adobe Photoshop, and digital video. She has a BA and a MS in communications from Shippensburg University.

HCC health sciences students participate in Mission of Mercy



Students in HCC's dental assisting and paramedic emergency services programs recently participated in the Western Maryland Mission of Mercy (M.O.M.) event at the Alleghany County Fairgrounds in Cumberland, Md.

HCC faculty and students joined volunteers from the local tri-state area to provide free dental care and first aid services to lowincome, uninsured, and underserved adults living in Alleghany County. According to the M.O.M. Web site, the need for oral health in Alleghany County is immense as it leads the state of Maryland in natural tooth loss. Conditions in nearby West Virginia are said to be even worse.

HCC students were joined by Theresa Marks, HCC instructor, dental assisting and hygiene and program coordinator; Devin Buries, HCC

instructor/program coordinator, EMS/ paramedic; and Gary Williamson, a local Hagerstown dentist. Each student and faculty member donated more than eight hours of volunteer time at the site. According to Buries, the paramedic students volunteered their time as first-aid personnel and worked with

people and to give back to the community. It's important for students to realize just how many people in our area need access to dental care."

M.O.M. events are held throughout the tri-state area and encourage professionals such as dentists, hygienists, dental assistants, paramedics, and other



standby EMTs to take care of minor injuries and medical complaints. The dental assisting students assisted area dentists with extractions, restoration, acute trauma care, and oral surgery. Both student teams also assisted with breakdown at the end of the event.

"For many of these students, this experience confirmed that this is what they want to do," says Marks. "It was a long, hard day and everyone was exhausted by the end of it, but it was a great feeling to know that we were able to help

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HCC bids a sad farewell to HCC paramedic instructor Austin Rinker



On Dec. 7, 2010, HCC said farewell to one of its most respected faculty members, Austin G. Rinker, who passed away at the age of 55.

An adjunct instructor at HCC, Rinker retired from the College at the end of summer 2010 after teaching and coordinating HCC's Paramedic Emergency Services program for the last six years.

According to a Herald-Mail article published on Dec. 26, Rinker "touched thousands of people, many of whom don't even know him. Through his career in emergency medical services and an interest in teaching emergency personnel, his impact on the lives of others was widespread."

Rinker was well-known throughout Washington County for his work in emergency services training, as well as for his teaching. He was often praised by students, professional col-

HCC and UMUC renew dual admission agreement



Officials at Hagerstown Community College (HCC) and University of Maryland University College (UMUC) recently met to renew and enhance their dual admission agreement. The agreement is designed to make it easier for students pursuing an associate's degree at HCC to transfer academic credits to UMUC to

complete a bachelor's degree. A unique reverse transfer option is also available for students who have not graduated to transfer credits back to HCC and earn their two-year degree.

"We are very pleased to be able to include UMUC among the fine institutions with which we have articulation agreements," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "This will allow students to seamlessly transfer from HCC to UMUC."

"As a university with alliances with all of Maryland's community colleges, we are excited to renew our longstanding dual admission agreement with HCC," said UMUC President Susan Aldridge.
"UMUC is dedicated to making higher education accessible to students in Maryland and throughout the world, and the renewal of this agreement is a testament to that dedication."

The dual admission agreement allows students to have access to UMUC services, including academic advising, financial aid information and career counseling, the university's extensive library resources and other student services at

UMUC and the University System of Maryland at Hagerstown.

Students can apply for the dual admissions program as early as their senior year of high school, but prior to completing their associate's degree at HCC. Students must also meet UMUC admissions requirements, which includes a cumulative grade-point average (GPA) of 2.0 or better on all college-level work attempted at other regionally accredited colleges and universities including University System of Maryland institutions. The Maryland Community College Transfer Scholarship will be made available to dual admission students who earn an associate degree at HCC and have at least a 3.0 GPA.



Manfre signs on as new biotech faculty





Officials at Hagerstown Community College are pleased to announce the appointment of Alicia Manfre as instructor of biotechnology. A graduate of North Hagerstown High School, Manfre went on to complete her doctoral degree in genetics from Clemson University.

"We are thrilled to have found someone of Dr. Manfre's caliber to take our growing biotechnology program to the next level," said Guy Altieri, HCC president. "Her knowledge, experience, insight, and

enthusiasm will undoubtedly be a huge asset to the program and its students."

"I am very excited to join the biotechnology program at HCC," said Manfre. "I am looking forward to working with the faculty, students, and secondary science teachers to develop and expand the opportunities for biotechnology education in Washington County."

In her new position, Manfre will teach a full load of credit courses within the biotechnology curriculum, serve as co-principal investigator with Mathematics and Science Division chair Judith Peisen for HCC's current National Science Foundation grant: Pathways to Careers in Biotechnology and Biomanufacturing, coordinate the Biotechnology Summer Institutes for **ESSENCE** students and secondary science teachers, coordinate off-campus student internship sites, and assist with administrative

duties within the division.

Before earning her Ph.D. in genetics from Clemson University, Manfre earned a bachelor's degree in biology from Texas Christian University. During summer breaks as an undergraduate student, she took a few classes at Hagerstown Community College.

Manfre most recently held the position of postdoctoral research associate with the United States Department of Agriculture in Kearneysville, W.Va. Prior to that, she held similar research positions with the Department of Cell Biology and Molecular Genetics at the University of Maryland, the Department of Biological Sciences at Dartmouth College, and the Department of Genetics, Biochemistry and Life Science Studies at Clemson University.

Manfre's research experience has primarily utilized molecular biology approaches to agricultural research questions. She has extensive experience in molecular biology techniques, including genomic and plasmid DNA extractions, RNA and protein isolations, as well as various types of polymerase chain reaction.

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Thornhill and Madron encourage students to help those in need





This fall, HCC students took the time to help those in need thanks to the encouragement of two Hagerstown Community College instructors, Sociology Instructor Daniel Madron and Paralegal Studies Professor Loretta Thornhill.

"In economic times like these, I think it is very important to remember how lucky we are and to help those who are not so fortunate," says Thornhill. "Even if you do a small thing, it can make a huge difference in someone's life."

Thornhill, who has taught at HCC since 1997, incorporates service learning into her Legal Environment of Business classes and also serves as the advisor to the HCC Service Club. Through both venues, Thornhill encourages students to work with other organizations in the community. This year,



Thornhill's students have sponsored a variety of community events including: a canned food drive for the Salvation Army; a clothing drive for Goodwill; a raffle for Star Equestrian Center; and a raffle to support a young girl with multiple illnesses. In addition, her students also participated in the Cumberland Valley's annual Step N Stride to raise money for breast cancer awareness; collected supplies to send to U.S. troops overseas; collected quilts for the pediatric ward at Washington County Hospital; held a series of car washes for CASA; and collected money for the Humane Society. The Service Club, which consists solely of HCC students, has raised more than \$300 for the Cumberland Valley Step N Stride; collected cards to send to U.S. troops overseas; raised money for the

Humane Society; and held a Toys for Tots drive.

Madron, who is a new instructor at the college and began teaching there in 2010, believes that one of the greatest underserved populations in the United States is the homeless and has been working to help those in need since his days as an undergraduate at Eastern University in Philadelphia, Pa. As a teacher, Madron says that he wants his students to experience sociology firsthand and encourages them to do so by raising money, seeking food donations, and helping serve those in need.

"After moving to Hagerstown, I wondered what we as a community could do to help those who are less fortunate and make their lives a little better. I immediately thought of the holidays—a time when many us stuff our faces with amazing food, spend time with friends, and family, and are warm and feel loved. I wanted to spread that feeling to others."

Through his efforts, Madron and his 130 students cooked and served an entire Thanksgiving dinner to 250 people at the Salvation Army, provided food and monetary donations to The Hagerstown Rescue Mission, which served approximately 300 people on Thanksgiving day, and provided dinners to multiple

families and senior citizens through the Community Action Council (CAC) and the Hagerstown Rescue Mission.

"Almost every one of my students participated in some way," says Madron. "It was actually quite incredible to see how involved some of the students became. I had one student who visited over 100 houses and raised more than \$100. That is awesome."

Madron has a bachelor's degree in marketing from Eastern University, a master's in sociology from UMBC, and is a Ph.D. candidate in the field of public policy at UMBC. Thornhill has a bachelor's degree in American government from Western Maryland University, a paralegal certificate from Penn State, a master's degree in American government from Hood College, and a master's degree in liberal arts from McDaniel College. Both instructors plan to continue encouraging these types of events in the future.

In related news, Early Childhood Education/Reading Instructor Mary Beth Chaney and the students of the Future Educators of America (FEA) held a dinner for the residents of CAMEO house this past fall.

Thorpe speaks at national consortium



Nancy Thorpe, associate professor, chemistry, was a presenter at the 190th Conference of the Two-Year College Chemistry Consortium (2YC3), in Raleigh, N.C., in Nov. 2010. Her presentation entitled, 'The Green Chemistry Blues Support Group, briefly discussed the integration of green chemistry into the chemistry curriculum and focused on exploring the Greener Education Materials (GEMs) database, a virtual assistant for green chemistry, and a social networking site, GCEdNet, for professionals in the green chemistry field.

"The concept of green chemistry is to prevent pollution, reduce waste, and protect our environment and health from the beginning to the end in the life cycle of a chemical or product," says Thorpe. "It is important to incorporate this topic into our chemistry curricula as we train our future scientists and engineers."

Thorpe has an AA in science and math from Montgomery College; a BS

in biochemistry from the University of Maryland; a MS geoenvironmental studies from Shippensburg University; and a Ph.D. in marine and estuarine environmental sciences with a specialty in environmental science from the University of Maryland. Her work has been published in the Journal of Environmental Science and Health. She has taught at HCC since 2001.

The All-USA Academic Team program is sponsored by the Coca-Cola Scholars Foundation and administered by the Phi Theta Kappa Honor Society. Each year, faculty and staff are allowed to nominate two students from each community college for the All-USA Academic Team. Students must meet a variety of criteria, including having a GPA of 3.5 or above and taking an active part in community service work through their school.

Faulkner, 24, is an English major at HCC and will graduate in May 2011. After graduating, she plans to transfer to the University of Maryland at College Park to pursue two bachelor's degrees in English and American studies. Faulkner will also pursue a master's degree in English, with the ultimate goal of teaching literature and creative writing at the college level.

The guide is part of the popular Roadside Geology series published by Mountain Press Publishing Company, which features more than 24 geology guides to various states. The Maryland guide chronicles places such as the C&O Canal National Historic Park, Assateague Island National Seashore, Rock Creek

Park, and Cape Henlopen State Park.

According to Suzannah, the idea for the book came about when she, her husband, and Means discovered that a Md. guide did not exist. They spent the next seven years working on the guide, which was released earlier this year.

Means retired in 2003 after teaching at HCC for 33 years. Moran currently teaches at the college and has been teaching there since 1999.

Davis' photograph, "Surreal Seas," was shot this past year while he and his family were on vacation. It features his daughter, Ellie, staring out at the sea. It was shot in color infrared, which gives the image unique and unusual hues. Davis' piece won the Juror's Choice Award sponsored by Photography by Dale.

Mauk's photograph, "Spirals," was shot in 2008 in Boston, Ma., while she was on vacation. It features a street scene in the heart of downtown Boston and was shot digitally in color before being converted to black and white using Adobe Photoshop.

Both Davis and Mauk are fine art and artistic photographers who have pursued this art form for a number of years. Davis began his photographic career as a

teenager and went on to shoot for his high school yearbook staff. After his daughter was born seven years ago, Davis became interested in image editing software and began experimenting with photography. He entered numerous online photography contests and has won pictures of the day, had images appear in magazines and newspapers, and has had



more than one of his images appear on the Kodak board in Times Square. Davis also does freelance photography work such as weddings and communions.

Some of Davis' most popular pieces are taken in infrared, such as the piece that he exhibited to the museum. According to Davis, he especially loves this medium because of the way it make an ordinary scene so surreal and provides strong, bold, and 'contrasty' images. HCC Foundation launches new capital campaign

With construction underway on the new Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Building, renovations begun on Kepler Theater, and planned renovations set for the Classroom and Science Buildings, the HCC Foundation is launching a \$1.6 million public capital campaign to raise funds for the furniture and equipment needed for these sophisticated new facilities.

"Most people don't realize that state and county funding for capital projects at colleges and universities do not provide the full cost of what is needed to furnish and equip these new buildings," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "As such, we need the community's support to complete these projects by helping provide funds for furniture and equipment beyond what is met through traditional funding sources."

"The new STEM building will provide extraordinary opportunities for students at HCC that were previously unavailable," said student Tessa Walls, of Hancock, Md. "This five-story building will allow for more specialized labs and classrooms for each particular subject. As a student double-majoring in biology

The STEM Building, scheduled for completion in fall 2011, will be a new 65,000 square foot facility that will take the place of the existing Science Building that was originally built in 1966. The new building will incorporate "green technology" throughout,

with eco-friendly roofing, wind/solar/ geothermal components, and energy efficient lighting. It will be home to all science and engineering programs with lab space for programs such as biotechnology, cybersecurity, and alternative energy technology.

The new Performing and Visual Arts Education Center and renovated Kepler Theater will include an upgraded theater, new lighting and sound system, an expanded lobby and gallery space, new practice and rehearsal areas, and a new dance studio. It will provide a natural place for students to transition from the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts.

The Classroom Building will receive a complete makeover, with improved accessibility and instructional space. The existing Science Building will be entirely refurbished and become the Learning Center, home to all developmental education and tutoring services.




