HCC commission reveals final recommendations

The Commission on the Future of Hagerstown Community College, which began its work in September 2010, held its final meeting to announce 17 recommendations and highlight priority areas for college officials to consider as they develop the college's Strategic Plan 2016. The 30-member commission was comprised of four study groups of community leaders, college faculty, administrators, students, staff, and alumni.

Although all of the recommendations are important for the college's future, the highest priorities identified were as follows: (1) continue collaborating with the public and private high schools and working toward the implementation of greater curricular agreements to assure college readiness; (2) maintain affordable tuition, fees, and college expenses; (3) continue efforts to seek public and private competitive grants to support institutional priorities and strategic goals; (4) continue collaborative efforts with county and state

representatives to secure and protect the fair share of funding for HCC; and (5) maintain adequate technology investments needed for student and staff success.

"This type of community input is critical to the success of the college and the community," said Guy Altieri, HCC president. "We were extremely fortunate to have a solid group of community leaders who devoted countless hours of their time to thoroughly review and make recommendations regarding future offerings and operations of the college. As a result, our students and the community-at-large will greatly benefit from the work of this group."

The groups focused on all areas of HCC and included (1) Students and Student Affairs; (2) Programs and Educational Support; (3) Finances, Facilities, Human Resources and Technology Support; and (4) Effectiveness and Quality Assurance. With the use of a survey tool, community leaders throughout Washington County and the surrounding area, as well as HCC graduates, provided valuable input regarding the future of HCC.

Commission findings, as well as survey results, indicate that the community feels that HCC does a very good job in meeting community and employer needs. Overall, it is recommended that HCC needs to better promote and market its credit and credit-free program offerings, its affordability, and the success of students, graduates and employees. The commission's recommendations will be used in the development of HCC's 2016 Strategic Plan, the self-study for its Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools reaccreditation. and annual institutional plans.

Carolyn Brooks, immediate past chair of the HCC Board of Trustees and current board member, and John League, editor and publisher of The Herald-Mail served as the co-chairs of the commission.

Students in the Web and Multimedia Program at Hagerstown Community College recently completed the design for the Women in Maryland Higher Education (WIMHE) Web site.

According to HCC Web and Multimedia Technology Instructor Sean Maher, each spring, students in the Web Server Administration course (WEB 205) are charged with the task of creating, designing, and implementing a new Web site for an outside non-profit organization or local business. HCC to work with Maryland Solar



Officials at Hagerstown Community College have reached a written understanding with Maryland Solar to incorporate the development, construction, and operation of the proposed Washington Countybased 20 megawatt solar farm, into the college's alternative energy technology curriculum.

"Being involved with a project of this scope allows HCC students to be exposed to the real-world implementation of an alternative energy system at a level beyond the typical residential and commercial application," said Tony Valente, HCC's lead instructor of alternative energy technology. "Site visits and videotaping of the installation, along with the ongoing data collection from the system's operation, will be extremely valuable to HCC's alternative energy curriculum."

"I'm excited about the leadership that HCC is showing in the areas of technology, not only for our community, but for our state," said Del. Andrew Serafini. "In STEM programs, such as solar, biotech, and cybersecurity, Dr. Altieri and the HCC staff are leading the way and I am fully committed to working with them as they move forward with these projects."

This proposed system will require advanced instrumentation and monitoring of its daily production, which can be easily incorporated into the STEM (science, technology, engineering, math) Building that is currently under construction on the HCC campus. The 65,000 square-foot STEM Building is scheduled to open in January of 2012 and will offer the most current technology to support HCC's math and science programs, including alternative energy technology, biotechnology, and cybersecurity. Space will be designated in the STEM Building to house the monitoring and data collection equipment for the solar farm, for use by HCC faculty and

students.

"This project is significant, not only to HCC and its students, but to regional economic development as well," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "Washington County is ideally positioned to be a leader in renewable energy and this partnership illustrates the importance of HCC's alternative energy technology program."

Maryland Solar LLC, an Easton-based energy company, has proposed building the 20 MW solar farm on leased state land surrounding the Maryland Correctional Institution, just south of Hagerstown. Construction is expected to begin by the end of 2011 with the commercial operation to begin in late 2012. The project would employ approximately 125 workers in the course of the one-year build-out and would double the amount of solar power currently on the Maryland grid. It would be the largest solar facility in the state and one of the largest on the East Coast.

HCC instructor makes it to third round of national novel writing contest



Amanda Skjeveland, assistant professor, English, recently participated in the annual "Amazon Breakthrough Novel Award Contest," where she advanced to the third round of finalists.

Held each year by Amazon.com, the contest accepts 10,000 fiction entries: 5,000 in general fiction and 5,000 in young adult fiction. Writers were asked to submit novels between 50,000 and 150,000 words that were previously unpublished or self-published. Judges narrowed down the entrants over a six-month period and two grand prize winners were announced at the contest's conclusion.

Skjeveland made it to the third round of the general fiction competition and was one of 500 entrants to make it to that level. As a quarterfinalist, her full manuscript was reviewed by Publishers Weekly. In addition, Amazon customers were able to download, rate, and review her novel on Amazon.com, which allowed readers to provide feedback for Penguin editors as they reviewed contest submissions.

"I was really nervous as I waited to find out whether

I'd made it to the third round," says Skjeveland. "Although I always tell my creative writing students to write for themselves, waiting to get that first feedback from readers is both exhilarating and terrifying."

Skjeveland, who says she's been writing since she could first hold a pencil, has previously published poetry and short fiction in literary magazines, but has never attempted to publish a novel. She wrote her 70,000-word novel, "Memorabilia," during the summer of 2010. She says that she undertook the project as part of her own personal "novel-writing month."

According to Skjeveland, NaNoWriMo (National Novel Writing Month) is held every November. Writers who participate in this project have the ultimate goal of completing a 50,000-word novel in one month but, for academics, trying to write an entire novel during the month of November is often a challenge. To circumvent this issue, Skjeveland held her own NaNoWriMo in June and wrote "Memorabilia" over a fiveweek period.

"The enthusiastic support from my family, friends, and co-workers has been amazing," says Skjeveland. "Writing is such a solitary task; it's an incredible feeling to sit alone for so many hours creating a new world, and then to realize that readers are actually excited to spend time in that world."



Conservation film by HCC adjunct instructor debuts June 14



"One With Life," the conservation film co-produced by Audra Haddock Martenot, adjunct faculty member at HCC, and Rob Owens, president and owner of Eagle Rock Productions, will debut on Tues., June 14, at the National Conservation Training Center (NCTC) in Shepherdstown, W.Va.

Filmed by Eagle Rock Productions, "One With Life" provides an intimate look at a growing, worldwide movement that emphasizes the need for people to connect with nature, with a special emphasis on the importance of engaging and encouraging children to explore the great outdoors.

"Today, the health of children is a great issue and the idea is to encourage them to get back to nature, to get away from the television and go play outside," says Martenot. "In their hearts, everybody knows that humans and nature are connected but people get busy and they forget. This film is another step to try to make people aware of the importance of nature: We can't exist without it and it can't exist without us. It's a way to try to bridge the gaps

between nature and ourselves."

The first public screening of the film will be held at 6:30 p.m. in the Byrd Auditorium at the NCTC, which is located at 698 Conservation Way in Shepherdstown. The public is invited to attend.

Maintenance and Custodial Guidelines continued...

Major Construction: Construction projects on campus have increased the amount of dust, dirt and gravel on the walkways, which consequently is carried into the buildings. It is recommended that staff make full-use of the walk-off mats at the entrance of the buildings to help keep the bulk of the debris outside the campus buildings.

<u>Recycling</u>: HCC recycles! Two types of collection bins are available: one for paper and one for comingled glass, plastic, and metal. Two sizes are available and include small bins for offices or classrooms and large bins, which are located in central common areas. Staff are asked to break-down boxes that will not fit in the bins and place them next to or behind the large bins located in central common areas. It is the responsibility of office occupants and classroom users to empty the smaller containers into the larger ones for custodial staff to collect.

<u>Carpets:</u> Carpets are cleaned regularly on campus. Staff are asked to avoid spills on carpet as much as possible. Please ensure that trash and garbage items are placed into the trash cans and not on the floor around them. When the inevitable spills do occur, please submit a work order request.

Offices: Each night, custodial staff empty trash, straighten furniture, and vacuum traffic patterns. On a scheduled basis and/or as needed, custodial staff also dust, wipe down surfaces, vacuum entire carpeted surfaces, and dry and wet-mop hard surfaces. If there are items on the floor, on shelves, or on table or desk surfaces, staff will do their best to clean around them. Generally, items other than chairs are not moved.

<u>Classrooms/labs</u>: Floors are vacuumed, dry-mopped and wet-mopped as needed. Trash is emptied and boards are cleaned on a daily basis. If anything written on the boards needs to be saved, please leave a bold, obvious note asking for it to be saved. In chemistry and biology labs, staff clean counters and sinks unless there are specimens or equipment laid out on these areas. Floors are dust-mopped and wet-mopped as needed. For the safety of the custodial crew and the environment, please dispose of all bio or chemical hazardous waste in the appropriate manner. If there is need for a special trash pick-up due to size or some other reason, please submit a work order request.
