Warner becomes new VP of Academic Affairs



C. David Warner III has been named vice president of academic affairs at Hagerstown Community College.

"Dr. Warner performed extremely well with all aspects of the search process that began with nearly 100 applicants, and he has excellent credentials to be successful with this most demanding job," said HCC President Guy Altieri. "His familiarity with HCC's service region, his prior experience as both a successful HCC professor and administrator, along with his knowledge of and contacts with state education officials, made him, in the final analysis, the best

candidate."

In this position, Dr. Warner will serve as the chief instructional officer of the college and will be responsible for the supervision, evaluation, and planning of the academic programs and related support services. He will also be responsible for faculty evaluation and related professional development programs and the development of the academic outcomes assessment program.

"I return home to HCC at a time when I know in my heart is right. I am very excited about the growth in new programs, enrollment and facilities at HCC. I am extremely honored and proud to serve as the next vice president of academic affairs," said Warner. "I leave USMH knowing that it is well positioned for success into the future, and I will continue to support the partnerships between HCC and USMH in my new position."

Warner returns to HCC after having served as the executive director of the University System of Maryland at Hagerstown since the center opened in 2004. Prior to that, he worked at HCC as the director of

instruction from 2003 to 2004, chair of the Humanities Division from 2000 to 2003, and professor of music, from 1986 through 2003. He holds a doctorate in community college education from Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, a master's degree in music from Towson University, and bachelor's degree in music education from Shepherd College.

"We are thrilled to have Dave Warner back at his home, HCC," says Joan Johnson, chair, English and humanities division. "Dave brings experience, breadth of knowledge, a great work ethic, and an ability to bridge differences and divides. Plus, he rocks!"

HCC students design educational game for elementary students

Four students in HCC's Simulation and Digital Entertainment (SDE) Program worked with Washington County Public Schools (WCPS) staff and students in the Computer Game Development and Animation (CGDA) Program at Washington County Technical High School to create, design, and develop an educational computer game for elementary school students in grades one through five.

The project was part of the \$339,602 USDA Culinary and Healthful Enhancement of Foods (CHEF) Grant, which was awarded to the Maryland State Department of Education (MSDE) in 2009. The grant is intended to facilitate the creation of "CHEF" teams in Maryland school systems, which consist of food service departments, culinary arts programs, teachers, and high school students. The goal of the grant is to diminish childhood obesity and provide healthy nutritional information to children, as well as improve the nutritional quality of school lunches.

"This grant is all about students creating healthy recipes for the types of foods they would like to purchase from their school cafeteria with the goal of reducing childhood obesity through healthy dining and nutrition education," said Jeffrey Proulx, WCPS supervisor of food and nutrition science and manager of the CHEF grant.

Grady Shingler, of Hagerstown, became involved with the grant as part of an internship through the college. The HCC student team was charged with the task of creating a computer game that would teach elementary school students about the USDA food pyramid. The student team began their work in Jan. 2011 and spent the next two months creating the concept, artwork, and programming for "Project Pyramid," an interactive, one-player computer game. The team received input from Washington County Board of Education (WCBOE) supervisors and community professionals throughout the development process to ensure the game would meet grant standards.

According to Ingraham, who served as project lead, the team's main goal was to provide a new spin on the food pyramid while still allowing children to have fun playing the game. To achieve this, the team built an adventure game in which players must navigate through five unique worlds, each of which represents one of the five basic food groups. Each world is ruled by an evil "sweet treat master," who must be defeated in order to save the food group citizens of that world. By answering questions and building their knowledge of each food group, players are able to progress through all five worlds until they've won the game.

HCC students Steve Ingraham, of Fairplay; Brandon Bishop, of Middletown; Michael Goodrich, of Myersville; and

"Steve, Brandon, Grady, and Michael are very productive in their SDE courses," said David Maruszewski, HCC instructor, simulation and digital entertainment. "I was glad to see them employ those skills in the internship project. Internships allow students to go beyond the classroom and apply theory to practice, as well as showcase their individual talents. In this case, Michael could explore his artistic strengths, Grady his programming skills, Brandon his natural producing intuitions, and Steve his design abilities."

The student team was also assisted by high school students in the CGDA program at Washington County Technical High School. Juniors in the CGDA program took character sketches created by Goodrich and created the game characters in Adobe Photoshop. They also assisted the team with many of the game animations.

"The CGDA program receives requests for internships from many different colleges because students in the program produce commercial quality products," said Martin Nikirk, computer game development and animation teacher, who served as game project manager on Project Pyramid and other USDA games. "We were happy to work with HCC on this project. The HCC interns were professional and demonstrated incredible leadership, creativity, and initiative in meeting the requirements for the USDA grant."

The HCC student team presented a one-level PC demo of the game to the WCBOE and MSDE on May 13. The game is expected to debut in local elementary schools in fall 2011.

Life-altering partnership develops in HCC's Fitness Center

amount of weight. "I was too large for a scale, so I went to go to the scale at the loading dock of Maryland Ribbon," Hawthorne said. "It was very humiliating."

Hawthorne's high school classmate and HCC employee Ann Carbaugh knew of Hawthorne's struggles and wanted to help. She contacted Burge and asked if he would be willing to assist. That inquiry paved the way for the partnership between the two.

"Thomas knows just how hard to push to help me, without burning me out," said Hawthorne. "He shares so much good information and treats

on the air with a purpose, offering inspiration to others."

Hawthorne has also been motivated through e-mail correspondence with Richard Simmons. He recently created a Facebook page, entitled "Inspire Your Journey," where he shares updates on his progress and offers tips to motivate, train, and inspire others to make similar changes in their lives.

Hawthorne and Burge are setting significant, but realistic goals as they look to the future. They will continue to make changes in his diet and exercise regime. One year from now, Hawthorne hopes to have dropped to about 300 pounds and be able to run a mile with

In their first e-mail exchange, Dan Hawthorne wrote to Thomas Burge, "I am in real bad shape. I am morbidly obese. Depression and a long chain of events have got me to this place." He went on to say, "I know if I don't get my life back soon, I won't have a life at all."

As coordinator of the Fitness Center at HCC, Thomas Burge agreed to help. He had previously helped others in similar situations make some positive life changes and was up for the challenge.

Hawthorne, 46, of Hagerstown, had struggled with weight issues most of his life. At nearly 600 pounds, he was at his heaviest when he stepped through the doors of the HCC Fitness Center.

"I was really nervous about coming to the college campus," said Hawthorne. "But, everyone here has been very positive and supportive, including the athletes, senior citizens who use the center, and even the janitors."

Hawthorne and Burge have created quite a bond in the short time they've been working together. "Within five to ten minutes, Thomas made me feel

comfortable. He said he could help me," said Hawthorne.

In the four months since that meeting, Hawthorne has lost more than 160 pounds, with help and encouragement from Burge. "His state of mind was in the right place when he came here," said Burge. "He was motivated."

The journey to meet Burge began years ago when Hawthorne broke his right ankle at the age of 13. It was an injury that would continue to present problems, and was worsened by years of working full-time in a retail environment where he had to be on his feet all day. When the standing became too much to bear physically, he quit his job and ended up at home, depressed and on the couch. During that time, he gained a significant



me like a friend." For the first time in a long time, Hawthorne feels as though his life has a purpose. "I've been given a second chance and now I want to give back to others," he said.

He and Burge will share their story on a regular radio show on FTNS, Internet fitness radio, beginning August 22. "I've done radio in the past," said Hawthorne. "But, now I can be

HCC professor Tom Clemens wins awards for Civil War work



advanced the study of the Civil War through preservation, publication, and education. Clemens was chosen because of his work as a historian, reenactor, and licensed tour guide at Antietam Battlefield, as well as his numerous publications and book reviews on Civil War history.

HCC professor Thomas Clemens recently won two awards for his work as a Civil War historian.

In April, Clemens received the Hagerstown Civil War Round Table's Henry Kyd Douglas Award, which is presented to individuals who have

Clemens received his second award in June when he was recognized as a 2010 Army Historical Foundation (AFH) Distinguished Writing Award recipient for his work on "The Maryland Campaign of September 1862, Volume I: South Mountain," the first

part of a two-volume historical, annotated manuscript that details one of the most famous campaigns of the Civil War. The manuscript itself is the work of Ezra A. Carman, a Union colonel in the 13th New Jersey Infantry, who was later appointed as the historical expert to the Antietam Battlefield Board in 1894. After the war, Carman wrote a 1,800-page manuscript on the Maryland Campaign, using firsthand accounts from war veterans and his own personal experience. In addition to eyewitness accounts, the manuscript includes maps and photos. A biographical dictionary will be included in Volume II, which is expected to be released in 2012.

According to Clemens, Carman's manuscript sat

untouched for decades in the Library of Congress, referenced by historians but never published in its entirety. Clemens, recognized internationally as one of the foremost historians of the Maryland Campaign, began studying the campaign as part of his doctoral dissertation, and has spent the last 11 years editing and annotating Carman's manuscript. The campaign itself Clemens has studied for more than 30 years.

A professor of history and political science, Clemens earned his doctoral degree from George Mason University. He is also one of the founders of the Save Historic Antietam Foundation, Inc., where he currently serves as foundation president. Clemens has been teaching at HCC since 1978.

Smith has a bachelor's degree in pharmacy from the University of Connecticut and a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Bucknell University. Recently, Smith served as a guest speaker at the Eighth Annual Spring CE Spectacular in Linthicum Heights, Md., during which she gave two lectures: one for pharmacy technicians and one for pharmacists. She has been teaching courses in the pharmacy technician program at HCC since 2008.

HCC student interns at Millennium 3 Energy



HCC announced that Zebulon Hull, of Hancock, is the first student in HCC's Alternative Energy Technology (AET) Program to intern at a renewable energy company.

Although he had taken classes previously at the college, Hull, 27, decided to enroll full-time in fall 2010 once he learned of HCC's new AET program, which was launched the same year. According to Hull, he became interested in alternative energy sources after high school as he learned more about the

rising costs of energy and the negative impact that fossil fuels have on the environment.

"I was hit hard by the recession and the internship as a whole has opened my eyes to the reality that people are serious about utilizing alternative energy and that jobs in the field really do exist," says Hull.

During his internship at Millennium 3 Energy, an energy company that specializes in solar photovoltaic (PV) system design and installation, Hull was able to gain first-

hand experience with the installation of solar PV systems when he worked with the company on a variety of solar installation projects including the addition of a 100.8 kilowatt system on a building at Sharrett Auto Mall in Hagerstown and the installation of 52.17 kilowatt system on a milking barn in Boonsboro. For the Sharrett project, Hull worked with solar technicians and electricians to install 429 solar panels on the import garage building, which will produce over 120,000 kilowatt hours per year. The system is expected to last for more than 25 years and will pay for itself in four years time.

"My internship began with the Sharrett project right here in Hagerstown," says Hull. "The fact that a local business has the foresight to invest in this technology and implement a change in how its energy needs are met is refreshing. Hopefully, other area businesses will follow Sharrett's example in taking steps to initiate energy indepen-

dence and the financial benefits ensuant with it."

"It's exciting to see our first alternative energy intern performing so well with Millennium 3 Energy," says Anthony Valente, lead instructor of HCC's alternative energy program. "These internships provide students with real-world experience and a sense of accomplishment, while at the same time providing part-time workers with skills that would have otherwise taken years to master if only learned on the job."

"As a young company in a growth industry, it's a great help to me that HCC has the alternative energy program," says Phil Kelly, owner, Millennium 3 Energy. "My first, and probably not last, intern from the program, Zebulon Hull, came to me with excellent knowledge of solar PV systems, and he was productive immediately on the job. While solar PV is not widespread in our region yet, it will be one day, and knowledgeable workers will be needed to support it. Most of those workers will probably come from HCC's AET program."

Marschner completes business coach training



Chris Marschner, manager of Hagerstown Community College's Technical Innovation Center (TIC), recently completed training on business coaching in Baltimore. The

two-day intensive clinic was adapted from materials designed by Corporate Coach U, the recognized leader in the coaching world.

Economic development staff and incubator managers from around the country, including three from Montgomery County, spent the two days practicing coaching skills, based on actual issues each participant was facing at the time. David Terry facilitated the training.

The program was designed to help participants sharpen their focus when working with clients. Too often the

issues facing early stage firms are so numerous and varied it is difficult or impossible to help the client firms address all those issues at one time. The program helps to dissect the issue into "chunks" that are attainable and measurable. For many entrepreneurs, issues that once seemed insurmountable became manageable and attainable after coaching.

The program also helps to unburden the incubation professional from feeling responsible for other people's outcomes. Incubator managers can only help entrepreneurs develop solutions to complex issues. They cannot ensure

that a positive outcome will result even with the best advice, if the client is unwilling to take the necessary steps for personal success.

"Learning and developing additional skills is something we all must do; it's part of our DNA at HCC. Having a professional coach work with us to refine and master some of the skills we need to use every day only helps us to improve the business development assistance we offer to our incubating and affiliate clients," Marschner said.

remember," says Bontempo. "It has been a privilege to have the opportunity to make a living doing what I love most, and it has been incredibly rewarding to have my work professionally accepted. Art makes a visual or emotional connection with people and that dialogue continues to be inspirational."

Bontempo has been creating art for more than 35 years and has shown her work in galleries and museums across the United States including the Detroit Museum of Arts, The Downey Museum of Arts, The Canton Art Institute, The Pittsburgh Art Institute, The Marin-Price Galleries, and the New Art

HCC's Robinwood Players recently performed, 'Happy Days—A New Musical' in early August under the direction of adjunct instructor Dave Dull.



The Hershey family recently donated more than \$120,000 in proceeds from the HCC Foundation Tribute Dinner, held annually in the ARCC.


