HCC receives \$650,000 grant for cybersecurity

HCC received notice in September that it had been awarded a \$650,000 grant from the National Science Foundation to prepare students for careers in the growing field of cybersecu-

rity.
"This award will posture HCC well to be a leader in cybersecurity education. both in Western Maryland and throughout the state," said Guy Altieri, HCC president. "We greatly appreciate the efforts of Senators Mikulski and Cardin to make federal dollars available for competitive grants for training and job creation in this important career area. As we prepare to open the new STEM Building, the timing couldn't be better in terms of ensuring that both the capital and operational resources are in place to train our students for cybersecurity and other STEM-related high-skill, high-wage careers."

HCC will use the grant funds to create a cybersecurity career pathway, developing partnerships with school systems, four-year institutions, and employers, including the Defense Information Systems Agency (DISA). In addition to new degree and certificate programs in cybersecurity,



HCC will offer hands-on training, professional development for teachers, and flexible course scheduling for students in the program. HCC's program will reach out to area high schools to encourage students to pursue cybersecurity careers.

HCC also recently received a \$50,000 grant from Cyberwatch, a consortium of over 40 higher education institutions, businesses, and government agencies. The grant will be used to conduct a community outreach campaign to heighten awareness of cybersecurity and cyber threats, and to create a cybersecurity institute to provide various types of short-term training for industry certification. As a

member of Cyberwatch, HCC has the opportunity to share best practices, methodologies, curricula, and course materials, as well as to receive training and support for its students and faculty.

HCC has been designated as a National Center of Academic Excellence in Information Assurance Two-Year Education (CAE-2Y) by the NSA and was one of the first six community colleges in the U.S. to receive this honor. This distinction enables students to transfer seamlessly from HCC to four-year colleges in order to complete their degrees.

Children's Learning Center raises money for St. Jude's Hospital



HCC's Children's Learning Center (CLC) recently participated in a Trike-A-Thon to raise money for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

More than 50 children between the ages of three and five participated in the event, which lasted for five days. Children learned safety lessons throughout the week and demonstrated those safety lessons to parents and staff on the last day of the Trike-A-Thon. Parents helped their children obtain sponsors for the event, which raised \$670 for St. Jude's Hospital.

"It's fun to see the children get excited about learning and safety," said Brenda Butler, a teacher at the HCC Children's Learning Center. "Trike-A-Thon gives us the opportunity to teach the children valuable safety lessons while also helping children who are battling cancer at St. Jude."

According to the hospital's website, St. Jude depends on community-based fundraising programs like Trike-A-Thon to cover the cost of treatment for its patients. The hospital directly absorbs medical costs not covered by insurance

so that no child is denied treatment due to a family's inability to pay. The daily operating cost for St. Jude is \$1.5 million, which is primarily covered by public contributions.

HCC's Children's Learning Center supports the child care needs of HCC students, faculty, and staff, and provides a learning laboratory for college students interested in working with young children. Children between the ages of two through five are accepted into the program. HCC student organizes "Operation Appalachia" supply drive for the needy



This holiday season, HCC student Heather Tydings, of Hagerstown, has made it her mission to help those less fortunate, specifically residents living in McDowell County, W.Va.

Tydings, a business major at HCC, was inspired to start the "Operation Appalachia" project after speaking with her father-in-law and his pastor.

"My father-in-law's church was looking for a special project for the holidays and he asked me to research organizations that donated food, clothing, and supplies to impoverished families living in the Appalachian region," says Tydings. "After doing some research, I came upon 'School of Life,' a nonprofit dedicated to helping people, especially children, living in McDowell County."

Founded by missionaries lack and Brenda Fultz, School for Life, Inc., seeks to improve the lives of the needy through supply donations and education. The organization is located in Gary, W.Va., a remote part of southern West Virginia. According to the School for Life website, McDowell County has an extremely high poverty rate for both children and the community as a whole. The U.S. Census Bureau reports that nearly 41 percent of McDowell County residents are living below poverty level. Of the 41 percent, more than half

that number pertains to children between the ages of five and 17.

'Once I learned about the conditions those people were living in, I knew I had to do something," says Tydings. "The childhood poverty rate in this county is undeniably a heartbreaking statistic. These children are born into poverty and rarely have the opportunity to escape. School for Life is taking steps to help these children get educated and hopefully out of the community and into college, breaking the cycle they have been born into. These kids need a chance and any little bit we can do is helpful."

To help McDowell County residents, Tydings decided to hold a supply drive from now through late December in order to collect clothing, blankets and linens, toiletries, children's toys, and non-perishable food items.

"This is about one community pulling together to help another. This is something we need to do," says Tydings. "This is our opportunity to make a difference in someone's life and to spread a little hope within a community that has lost hope. The people of this town need to feel that they are not alone. We, as a community, are more blessed than we realize and we need to share that gift with others."

To get the community

involved in her project, Tydings spent two weeks visiting area businesses to ask if they would be willing to serve as drop-off locations for the Operation Appalachia drive. Several businesses agreed including HCC.

Psychology Professor Vaughn Crowl retires after 41 years



This January 2012, Psychology Professor Vaughn Crowl will retire after 41 years of service.

Crowl has touched the lives of many students during his time at HCC. He first began teaching psychology at HCC in 1970. During his first three years at the college, he also served as the director of student activities. In later years, he would go on to serve as a counselor, an instructor of physical education in racquetball and triathlon training, and chair of both the Physical Education and Leisure Studies

Division, as well as the Behavioral and Social Sciences/ Business (BSS) Division.

"My goal has always been to develop

and implement a visionary leadership mission into College teaching," says Crowl. "One which integrates intellectual, political, social, economic and spirited resources into the delivery of a new standard of teaching excellence in higher education."

In 1998, he became the director of the learning community, a partnership

project between HCC and Washington County Public Schools (WCPS). Leadership roles he has undertaken at HCC include chairing the Faculty Assembly, chairing the Curriculum Committee, chairing the Learning Community

Steering Committee, cochairing the Middle States Accreditation Study, and founding the Student Leadfrom Johns Hopkins University in 1974. Following that, he earned a master's of science in counseling psychology/behavioral psychology from Johns Hopkins University in 1979. In 1987, he completed his doctoral degree in counseling and human development at the American University.

For his doctoral dissertation, Crowl focused on



ership Kepler Scholar Program. Crowl also served as

the director for the All-County Honors Chorus on two separate occasions.

Crowl began his education in 1964

when he pursued a double-major in psychology and political science at Frostburg State University. He graduated in 1968 and four years later completed a master's of education degree in guidance and counseling from Johns Hopkins University Baltimore. He earned a certificate of advanced study in counseling and therapy with a minor in higher education


Hagerstown Community College, then Hagerstown Junior College. His dissertation, "Educating Rural Maryland: A Historical and Anecdotal History of Hagerstown Junior College" was published by the Maryland Historical Society in 1987.

In honor of Crowl's contributions to the college, the BSS Division launched the "44 Ways to Change the World" project in September. For the project, BSS faculty asked current students, former students and alumni, faculty, and staff members begin an individual or group service project in Crowl's honor. Participants were asked to document their work through pictures and submit photos and a brief summary for inclusion in a scrapbook that would be given to Crowl during the fall semester.

"The Crowl Project was a



great success," says Loretta Thornhill, professor, paralegal studies, and a fellow faculty member in the BSS Division. "Many people participated in the project and shared stories of how Vaughn had touched their lives in some way. Submissions ranged from Mike Harsh dedicating his year as United Way Chair in honor of Vaughn; Tom Clemens' wife helping a classmate at Hood with the purchase of a textbook; and Stacey McGee helping with a project at her daughter's school. We also had HCC graduates writing in to say that they met during one of



Vaughn's classes and ended up getting married or telling us about how Vaughn influenced their lives with his kindness and inspiration. Dr. Crowl has inspired many people to change the world."

The scrapbook was presented to Crowl at his retirement celebration on Oct. 27.

HCC student interns at C&O Canal, dreams of being a park ranger



HCC student Melissa Jones, of Hagerstown, recently completed a summer internship at the Chesapeake and Ohio (C&O) Canal National Historical Park.

During her internship, Jones, 29, served as an interpretive intern at the C&O Canal where she helped conduct research to develop a new program for the Amtrak Capital Limited Line that runs from Cumberland to Washington, D.C. As part of the Amtrak program, volunteers will share canal history with passengers as the train travels along the canal.

According to Jones, she came to HCC specifically with the goal of working for the National Park Service. "The internship was perfect because it gave me a taste of exactly what I hope to be doing in my career," says Jones. "It was a 'real 40 hours a week' position, which gave me the opportunity to experience the many different tasks that I will be asked to do when I become

a ranger."

Jones says that her favorite part of the internship was meeting and interacting with canal visitors.

"Whether they were there for recreation or to learn about the amazing history of the C&O Canal, it was such a pleasure to meet so many people from so many different places. It was incredibly rewarding to see others enjoying the park as much as I do and it's fantastic to know that I can personally be a part of helping each visitor have an excellent experience at America's greatest treasure - our national parks."

Prior to completing her internship, Jones and her fellow intern, Ben Guell, helped a visitor in distress at Maryland Heights near Harpers Ferry, W.Va. According to Curt Gaul, west district ranger at the C&O Canal NHP, Jones and Guell were approached by a visitor running down from Maryland Heights. The visitor was a leader of a youth group and one of the youths

was suffering from heat exhaustion. Jones and Guell immediately called dispatch to report the situation and request medical support and ranger backup.

"When they reached her, the youth was unresponsive and due to the severity of the situation, Ben ran back down the trail so that he could get radio contact and report the status to dispatch. Melissa stayed with the youth and tried to make the girl comfortable while they waited for the medical unit and the rangers to arrive. Kudos to both Melissa and Ben for their quick action," said Gaul.

Jones will graduate from HCC in spring 2012. After graduation, she plans to transfer to Shepherd University where she will complete a bachelor's in history with a concentration in public history. After graduating from Shepherd, she plans to apply for a full-time position with the National Park Service.

HCC graduates find employment in mechanical engineering field







Three graduates from HCC's Mechanical Engineering Technology (MET) Program recently found fulltime employment at local engineering companies. Jeremiah Keller, of Wolfsville, Md.; Jeff Pine, of Clear Spring; and Kellina Shives, of McConnellsburg, Pa., graduated from HCC in May 2011. During their time at HCC, all three students completed internships with local engineering firms, which, in addition to their coursework, helped to provide them the necessary skills and on-site job trainingneeded for future employment.

"Internships are a fantastic way for students to practice the skills they've learned in the classroom in a real world setting," says Bonnie Saunders, coordinator, internship and job services at HCC. "The internship provides students with an opportunity to gain valuable work experience and further develop an understanding of their new profession."

On his internship, Keller, 25, worked with Hess Construction and Engineering Services, Inc., which is currently on-site at HCC to build the college's new Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM) Building.

After graduation, Keller took a job at Volvo Powertrain, where he works as a manufacturing engineer, using Autodesk Inventor to draw three-dimensional parts for the company.

Pine, 46, also worked with Hess Construction and Engineering Services, Inc. on his internship. After graduating in May, Pine took a job at Rampf Molds, a company that creates dry cast concrete production molds, where he runs the CNC (computer numerical control) machine, which places the design on the stone. According to Pine, he worked in the masonry field for 17 years before coming back to school in 2005 to earn his certificate in computeraided design (CAD) from HCC. After he earned his certificate, he worked as a civil engineer for four years before returning to HCC to pursue his A.A.S. degree in mechanical engineering techShives, 22, interned at DL Martin, a company that creates machining, manufacturing, and mining equipment for contractors and businesses. After her internship, Shives was hired on full-time and currently works at DL Martin as a mechanical engineer. In the near future, she plans to transfer to Penn State Harrisburg to pursue a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering technology.

"Dedication and hard work are what got these students to where they are today," says Stephanie Rittler, instructor, mechanical engineering technology at HCC. "They all graduated and were hired by great companies at a time when new jobs can be difficult to find. The diversity of the fields in which they were hired demonstrates the broad education that students receive in the MET program at HCC."

Two students intern at Appalachian Fruit Station in Kearneysville

HCC students Douglas Soffe, of Mercersburg, Pa., and Samantha Yarrington, of Martinsburg, W.Va., recently finished 15-week internships at Appalachian Fruit Research Station (AFRS) in Kearneysville, W.Va.

Soffe and Yarrington are both biotechnology majors. During their internships, they worked directly with AFRS scientists to research biotic, environmental, and genetic problems and effects on fruit crops. Soffe studied drought resistance in Gala apples while Yarrington studied the genetic link between peaches and nectarines in the hopes of identifying disease-resistant genes, which could then be applied to other fruits through bioengineering.

"I think it's wonderful that we were able to place Doug and Samantha at AFRS for their internships," says Alicia Manfre, lead instructor and program coordinator for HCC's Biotechnology Program. "They are bright, capable students and I was very excited that they were given the opportunity to participate in the exciting research that goes on at AFRS. Both Doug and Samantha were able to gain valuable research skills and experience while working on their respective projects, and each of them provided essential data that will further the research of their AFRS supervisors.'

Soffe, 36, will graduate in June 2012. After graduating in 2012, Soffe plans to find



work in the area of molecular biology and research and hopes to perform lab work similar to that which he did on his internship.

Yarrington, 25, graduated in Aug. 2011. After completing her internship, Yarrington took a job with EcoLab, a company that specializes in

the creation of sanitizers, cleaners, food safety, and infection prevention products, where she performs quality analysis, testing products that are in process, as well as the final product that is produced.
