The student will be able to:

- Critically analyze and evaluate issues derived from the Social Sciences utilizing appropriate methodologies.
- Demonstrate how culture, society and diversity shape the role of the individual within society and human relations across cultures.

**Assessment** (How do or will students demonstrate achievement of each outcome?)

Assessments include collaborative learning presentations, a capstone roundtable discussion, map quizzes and examinations.

**Validation** (What methods have you used or will you use to validate your assessment?)

The collaborative learning presentations, capstone roundtable discussion and open-ended exam questions are assessed using rubrics which have been shared with and reviewed by other Behavior and Social Science faculty. Most of the closed-ended examination questions have been drawn from the textbook *World Regional Geography Concepts* and associated ancillaries. These items have been peer-reviewed and revised to facilitate the development of geographic perspectives and related problem-solving skills.

**Results** (What do your assessment data show? If you have not yet assessed student achievement of your learning outcomes, when is assessment planned?)

- I. 88% of students scored 80% or above on the assessment of their analysis of current and historical cultural concepts (collaborative learning presentations)
- II. 82% of students scored 80% or above on the assessment of current socio-economic, cultural and political issues (roundtable) and there was a 9% increase between pre- and post-test scores on related questions.
- III. 82% of students scored 80% or above on the assessment of influential geographic factors (roundtable)

**Follow-up** (How have you used or how will you use the data to improve student learning?)

Students struggle when asked to assess current socio-economic, cultural and political issues and so in future semesters the course will emphasize the forces of homogenization and diversification.
