# HCC opens new STEM and Kepler Buildings

HCC began the new year with the opening of its much-anticipated STEM Building and the renovated Kepler Theater, which includes the addition of the Performing and Visual Arts Education Center.

These new buildings allow HCC students and faculty to learn and teach both math-and-sciences and arts-and-humanities in state-of-the-art facilities unlike anything offered in the region.

As these new buildings opened, year-long renovations began on the Classroom Building and the former Science Building, which were initially built in 1966. The Classroom Building will become a modern teaching facility and continue to serve as a main instructional location on campus. The Science Building will be transformed into the Learning Center and be home to all developmental education and tutoring services, faculty offices, a faculty professional development center, and three classrooms.

These much-needed construction projects come on the heels of nearly a decade of solid enrollment growth. From 2002 to 2011, HCC's credit enrollments grew by 76 percent. In FY 2011, HCC served



6,850 students in credit programs and 9,478 in continuing education programs for a total of 15,611 different students.

Within the STEM Building are sophisticated new spaces for HCC's biotechnology, alternative energy technology, and cybersecurity programs. The building's design has incorporated many sustainable and green technologies for energy efficiency and instructional purposes. HCC is also working with Maryland Solar to set-up instrumentation in the STEM Building that will allow students to monitor the energy produced from the solar farm being built near the prison.

The Kepler Theater and Performing and Visual Arts Education Center contain a black box theater, practice rooms, dance studio, classrooms, expanded dressing rooms, costume shop, extended wardrobe storage, faculty offices, and a completely refurbished theater. HCC is expanding its offerings in these areas and now provides a natural place of transition for students coming from the Barbara Ingram School for the Arts.

Both buildings will be officially dedicated in winter 2012. The dedication ceremony for the Kepler Center will be held on Fri,, March 30, at 10 a.m. The dedication ceremony for the STEM Building will be held on Fri., April 27, at 10 a.m. In addition, HCC will also hold its first "Arts & Sciences Day @ HCC" event on Sat., April 28.

## Legislative efforts: Altieri testifies on behalf of Md. community colleges



With continued budgetary struggles at the local, state and federal levels, community college leaders are more involved than ever in helping spread the word about the strength of community colleges and their need for adequate funding.

As chair of the Maryland Community College Council of Presidents, Guy Altieri helped shape the legislative agenda for MACC. In early February, he, along with DeRionne Pollard, president of Montgomery College, and Clay Whitlow

from the MACC office, testified on behalf of Maryland's community colleges before the Maryland Senate Education, Business, and Administration Subcommittee of the Budget and Taxation Committee.

In his testimony, Dr. Altieri highlighted the need for state and county funding to allow community colleges to keep tuition increases as low as possible. He stressed the challenges that would result if state pension funds are transferred to local governments. He also

discussed the proposed changes to the Cade Funding Formula and the negative impact that would have on community colleges. Administrators, however, are not the only community college advocates making their presence known in Annapolis. On Feb. 9, eight students from HCC joined hundreds of students representing all 16 Maryland community colleges in an effort to urge lawmakers to help keep community colleges affordable by supporting full funding in the governor's FY13 budget.

During this annual Student Advocacy Day, the students focused their message on the theme of "Support = Success," asking lawmakers to support the Cade Funding Formula and community college capital requests in order to enable community colleges to continue to provide high-quality higher education with affordable tuition rates. ### **HCC** named military friendly school



HCC has been named as a 2012 Military Friendly School by the G.I. Jobs Military Friends School team. The list features 1,518, or 20 percent, of the 8,000 schools in the nation that are doing the most to embrace America's veterans.

"We strive to serve the unique needs of veterans who come to us to further their education," said Kevin Crawford, HCC recruitment coordinator. "We are pleased to be recognized as a school that acknowledges the importance of helping this special group of students, and we will continue to do all that we can to assist them."

HCC has representatives within its admissions/ registration and advising offices who are designated to assist veterans with benefits information, related paperwork, academic and career planning, and evaluation of education received in the military and other prior learning experiences. There is also

a veterans club, organized and run by veteran students with guidance from a faculty advisor.

The Military Friendly Schools list is determined through research done by government agencies and private entities, which administer education benefits and a comprehensive survey. An advisory panel, consisting of five higher education administrators, helps determine survey questions and weightings based on programs and policies, financial commitment by the institution, school's results in military/veteran recruitment, and the school's academic accreditation.



### HCC staff and faculty participate in **College Completion Summit**



Half of all undergraduate students in Maryland are now enrolled in community colleges. In an effort to help increase the number of students who successfully complete their programs of study, faculty and administrators at Hagerstown Community College recently participated in the second annual Summit on Completion, hosted by the Maryland Association of Community Colleges (MACC).

'The college completion agenda has been on the radar of national, state, and local officials," said Guy Altieri, HCC president and chair of the Maryland Council of Community College Presidents. "As a community college, we are making great progress on increasing completion rates and in developing new strategies to ensure continued improvement. It's important for us, however, to make clear distinctions between the nature of community colleges and four-year institutions."

MACC is focused on explaining the differences between community colleges and four-year schools. Most community college students attend part-time, so it takes them much longer to complete their programs. A Maryland model for measuring completion appropriately takes into account student associate degree and certificate attainment, and successful transfer to four-year schools. Completion rates of community college students who attend full-time are comparable to completion rates attained at many four-year institutions.

In Maryland, community college leaders have identified 80 best practices for increasing student completion success. Part of these efforts includes revamping developmental education programs to ensure that more students in need of remediation are able to succeed in college-level work.

During the Summit on Completion, HCC faculty members shared some of their best practices. Joan Johnson, chair of the English and humanities division, and Dawn Schoenenberger, director of developmental education and adult basic education, gave a

presentation on their collaboration with Washington County Public Schools to offer a course that prepares high school students for college-level English. Cynthia Dove, associate professor of anatomy and physiology, and Judith Peisen, chair of the math and science division, gave a presentation on the use of student learning outcomes assessment data to identify strategies for improving completion for at-risk prenursing students.

"HČC has a long history of commitment to student success," said David Warner, vice president of academic affairs at HCC, "but the challenging economic conditions require that we do even more. The faculty and academic officer-led Curriculum Excellence Project, implemented in the fall of 2010, is another way we are helping students obtain their educational and career goals in a more timely manner."

Maryland's 16 community colleges are firmly committed to addressing these issues and have embraced Governor O'Malley's "Skills2Compete Maryland" agenda to increase degree and certificate attainment by 20 percent by 2012. They have also authored a statewide pledge of commitment to the completion agenda laid out by the president and other national leaders, calling for an increase in the number of Americas with college degrees to 55 percent by 2025.

Two students at HCC recently found employment at local pharmacies. Blanca Quezada, of Hagerstown, and Jeffrey Cook, of Clear Spring, are pharmacy technician majors who recently completed student internships at nearby pharmacies, which, in addition to their coursework, helped to provide them the necessary skills and on-site job training needed for their employment.

"By completing HCC's



pharmacy technician program, these students had a chance to learn about the theoretical basis of pharmacy practice and gain experience in compounding and preparing IV solutions before they began their internships," says Elaine Ashby, professor, biology/chemistry and pharmacy technician program coordinator. "Our students have had good luck finding jobs and employers have told me that they appreciate how

well-trained our students are."

Quezada, 18, interned at Meritus Medical Center, Robinwood Home Care Pharmacy, and Potomac Pharmatech in Williamsport. Quezada says that the most rewarding part of her internship was being able to have handson experience and getting an idea of what her career would be like as a pharmacy technician. Quezada received her pharmacy technician certificate in December 2011 and will go on to complete her associate's degree in chemistry. She is currently employed at the Meritus Medical Center inpatient pharmacy.

Cook, 42, also interned at Meritus Medical Center, Robinwood Home Care Pharmacy, and Potomac Pharmatech. Cook says that his favorite part of the internship was learning the different aspects of pharmacy and gaining pharmacy practice experience in retail, institutional, and long-term care. Cook will receive his pharmacy technician certificate in May 2012. After graduating, Cook plans to enroll in HCC's new pre-pharmacy program with the ultimate goal of attending pharmacy school after he completes his associate's degree. Like Quezada, Cook is employed at the inpatient pharmacy at Meritus Medical Center.

"We are incredibly proud of the success of these two students," says Ashby. "Both Blanca and Jeff have had excellent internship experiences and their preceptors have spoken about how well-trained and intelligent they are. I think both students have a great future ahead of them."

# HCC student veterans club accepted into national organization



The Student Veterans Club at HCC was recently recognized as an official chapter of the Student Veterans of America (SVA).

Founded in 2008, SVA is a 501 (c) (3) coalition of student veterans groups that seeks to provide military veterans with the resources and support needed to succeed in higher education, as well as in the years following graduation. Currently, the

organization is comprised of more than 500 chapters worldwide.

HCC's Student Veterans Club was founded in 2011 by HCC student Allen Calvert, of Rohrersville. According to Calvert, he realized that a student veterans club on campus would greatly help veterans assimilate to their new life.

"The college climate and culture is dramatically different from military life so it took me several months to acclimate to this new environment and I think it's the same for most veterans," says Calvert. "By forming the veterans club, I wanted to establish an entity that would endure well past my own graduation and to have that organization be one of familiarity and support for

veterans as they transition to college life."

The HCC club is led by four student officers and two faculty advisors. The club works closely with college admissions staff to determine what resources would best benefit veterans and to assist with veteran student outreach and advocacy.

"As a former U.S. Marine Captain and an advocate for veterans, I know what it's like to be disoriented when you return from service," says Robert "Bo" Myers, director, athletics and leisure studies, and co-advisor of HCC's Student Veterans Club. "It's important for veterans to be assimilated into the college community. The affiliation with SVA is a wonderful opportunity for our club to network with



veterans from other colleges and universities. We'll be able to share ideas and best practices that will help our members better serve our college and the community as


