For Drivers licensed in Maryland:

- Vision Specialist may use the MVA's Authorized Online Vision Certification program and electronically submit their vision examination results to the MVA via a secure website; or
- Vision Specialist may download and complete the MVA Vision form (DL-043A); or
- have a vision screening conducted at the MVA.

Driver's License Requirements

All MD driver's license applicants and renewals must meet certain vision requirements.



To qualify for an unrestricted driver's license, the State of Maryland requires drivers to have:

- Binocular vision
- Visual acuity (Snellen) of at least 20/40 in each eye
- A continuous field of vision of at least 140 degrees

Driver's License Requirements



Restricted licenses may be issued to persons having:

- Visual acuity of at least 20/70 in one or both eyes
- A continuous field of vision of at least 110 degrees, with at least 35 degrees lateral to the midline of each side
- Note: These two requirements must be simultaneous.
- Example: B restrictioncorrective lenses;
 C restriction- outside mirrors

Non- commercial Driver's License Requirements




- Binocular vision
- Visual acuity (Snellen) of at least 20/40 or better in each eye
- A field of vision of at least 70 degrees in each eye
- The ability to distinguish between red, green and amber colors

Commercial Driver's License Requirements

Applicants for commercial driver licenses must meet both state and federal vision requirements.



Statutory Authority of the MAB §TR 16-118



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Administrator may refer to the Medical Advisory Board, for an <u>advisory opinion</u>, the case of any licensee or applicant for a license, if the Administrator has good cause to believe that the driving of a vehicle by him would be contrary to public safety.....

Paths to Driver Wellness & Medical Advisory Board



- > ALJ/court referral includes DWI/DUI
- > Police submit a Request for Re-examination
- > Self report on application and at the time of renewal
- > Report from a clinician
- > Concerned citizen report (family, friend, neighbor...)
- > Counter referrals

Clinician referral to the Maryland MVA is voluntary and is permitted in Maryland per Vehicular Law §16-119:

- (a) The Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, together with the Medical and Chirurgical Faculty and the State Board of Examiners in Optometry, shall define:
- (1) Disorders characterized by lapses of consciousness; and
- (2) Disorders that result in a corrected visual acuity that fails to comply with the vision requirements of this subtitle.
- (b) (1) Except as provided in paragraph (2) of this subsection, any physician and any other person authorized to diagnose, detect, or treat disorders defined under subsection (a) of this section may report to the Medical Advisory Board and to the subject of the report, in writing, the full name, date of birth, and address of each individual 15 years old or older who has any such disorder.
- (2) Unless authorized by the individual in writing, a report may not be made from information derived from the diagnosis or treatment of any individual on whom a confidential or privileged relationship is conferred by law.

[Please Note: Maryland Vehicular Law §16-119 allows physicians to report individuals with 1) disorders characterized by lapses of consciousness; and 2) disorders that result in a corrected visual aculty that falls to comply with the vision requirements. Physician reports are 1) confidential; 2) may be disclosed only on court order; and 3) may be used only to determine the qualifications of an incividual to drive, A civil or criminal action may not be brought against a physician who makes a report under this section and who does not violate any confidential or privileged relationship conferred by law. [Notes: Physician-patient privilege. - Apart from the psychologist and psychiatrist privilege in §0-109 of the Courts Article, there is no physician-patient privilege in Maryland. 71 Op. Att'y Gen. 407 (1988). Disclosure of records. - Prohibitions of \$4-301 (b) of the Health - General Article do not prevent physicians from reporting under this. section, 71 Op. Voluntary Physician Referral Form (DC-220)

MVA Evaluation

- Client is assigned a nurse case manager in Driver Wellness and Safety.
- Client submits the requested Medical information.
- Case is reviewed by the Medical Advisory Board and a recommendation is rendered.
- Nurse Case manager sends the client correspondence regarding the outcome of the medical review.

Modified Visual Acuity Program

The Maryland MVA **Modified Visual Acuity** Program allows novice and currently licensed drivers with corrected visual acuity worse than 20/70 but not worse than 20/100, in one or both eyes, to obtain a restricted Maryland driver's license. The individual must also have a continuous field of vision of at least 110 degrees.

Modified Visual Acuity Program



Client's that were previously licensed must successfully complete the following:

- Clinical and behind-thewheel evaluation at an authorized driver rehabilitation facility;
- 20 hours of customized driver training at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- Standard Maryland driver's examination at the MVA's Glen Burnie Office

Modified Visual Acuity Program



If client is a Novice driver (never had a driver's license):

- Clinical evaluation at an authorized rehabilitation facility;
- 10 hours of basic driver's education at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- Behind-the-wheel evaluation at an authorized rehabilitation facility;
- 20 hours of customized driver training at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- 60 hours of driving supervised by a parent, guardian or other supervising driver as required of all novice drivers; Pass MVA drive test

Modified Visual Acuity Program



The following restrictions will be placed on the driver's license:

- outside mirrors each side
- daylight driving only restriction
- may only drive a vehicle weighing 10,000 pounds or less

Modified Visual Acuity Program



- After client is licensed through the Modified Vision Program, they will be requested to submit an annual Modified Vision Packet for medical review in order to maintain their license.
- The client may request removal of the Daylight Driving only restriction after meeting certain established criteria.
- The client is responsible for all costs associated with the driver rehabilitation center, low vision training driving school and the standard fees for a Maryland driver's license.

Modified Visual Acuity Program



The Maryland MVA **Driver Wellness &** Safety Modified Visual Field Program allows novice and currently licensed drivers who have a continuous field of vision of less than 110 degrees to pursue obtaining a restricted Maryland driver's license.



A Medical Advisory Board Ophthalmologist will review the initial Modified Vision Packet. If the client has any other nonophthalmologic medical condition(s) the case is also reviewed by another member of the Medical Advisory Board. If the client is approved, they may then begin the program.



Client's that were previously licensed must successfully complete the following:

- Clinical and behind-thewheel evaluation at an authorized driver rehabilitation facility;
- Customized driver training at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- Standard Maryland driver's examination at the MVA's Glen Burnie Office



If client is a Novice driver:

- Clinical evaluation at an authorized rehabilitation facility;
- 10 hours of basic driver's education at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- Behind-the-wheel evaluation at an authorized rehabilitation facility;
- 20 hours of customized modified vision driver training at an authorized low vision driver training driving school;
- Then continue with standard licensing process.



The following restrictions will be placed on all driver's license:

- outside mirrors each side
- daylight driving only restriction
- may only drive a vehicle weighing 10,000 pounds or less



- After client is licensed through the Modified Vision Program, they will be requested to submit an annual Modified Vision Packet for medical review in order to maintain their license.
- The client is responsible for all costs associated with the driver rehabilitation center, low vision training driving school and the standard fees for a Maryland driver's license.
