COURSE: EMS 151 – Introduction to Emergency Medical Services 3 Credits

INSTRUCTOR: SEMESTER/YEAR: Fall 2015

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course introduces students to emergency medical services design, roles and responsibilities, paramedic wellness, critical thinking in the prehospital environment, paramedic assessment and diagnosis, history taking, and physical examination. Total of 45 hours.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Identify the individual responsibilities of a paramedic in promoting, modeling, and maintaining wellness.
- Describe the precautions needed for body substance isolation.
- Integrate chief complaint, history, physical exam, and diagnostic tests using the diagnostic approach in order to formulate a treatment plan for the patient.
- Describe different methods of critical thinking, as related to paramedic assessment and diagnosis.
- Explain the laws, rules, regulations, policies, procedures, protocols, and standing orders of the paramedic's organization so care can be rendered in an ethical manner.
- Describe the types of consent that is legally required prior to providing EMS care.
- Identify and understand the elements of malpractice/negligence and how to avoid it.
- Demonstrate safe IV cannulation using various devices
- Describe the attributes and behaviors required of an EMS professional
- Explain various methods of organizing information gathered during a paramedic call.
- Describe the role you play in shaping the future of EMS
- Recognize the impact of culture, values, and belief systems in order to prepare the student for success in a health care profession.
