participated in academic instruction in mathematics, English, science, and world language. Washington County Public School teachers were hired to develop and implement activity-based learning curricula, and Hagerstown Community College faculty taught college coursework for English 101, and chemistry 101 with the corresponding lab. Additional students enrolled in an English 102 summer class for transfer credit. Students attended class Monday through Thursday and had the opportunity to utilize several resources available to them on campus, such as the library and Learning Support Center for tutoring. After successful completion of the Summer Academy, students could earn up to two high school elective credits and/or 3-9 college credits. The academy was at no cost to the student - tuition and fees were funded by the U.S. Department of Education and Hagerstown Community College. Transportation and meals were provided by Washington County Public Schools. In addition to their coursework, students also participated in Friday Field Trips: Cedar Ridge Adventures, Frostburg State University, Towson University & the National Aquarium, West Virginia University, Shippensburg University, Penn State Mont Alto, Hershey Museum and Hersheypark.

The Upward Bound Scholarship fund was created in late 2014 in an effort to further assist students with college expenses. Funding for the scholarship relies solely on fund-raising efforts by Upward Bound students and staff.
