COURSE: HIS 207: The Civil War, 3 credits

INSTRUCTOR: Dr. Timothy Jenness **SEMESTER/YEAR:**

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course focuses on the political, social, cultural, and economic climate of the Civil War period, and how the North and South came to the war. The military aspects of the war, and the political and moral decisions tied to them are the major emphases. Total of 45 hours of lecture.

- An understanding of the complicated causes and results of the Civil War.
- An appreciation for the connections between the Civil War and post-war problems.
- Skill in analyzing critically key historical events by analyzing relevant primary documents.
- An ability to write cogently and critically in answering historical questions.
- A demonstrated willingness and ability to engage in verbal discussions in which they must take a position on an historical question and defend it.

- 1. The student will be able to critically analyze and evaluate issues derived from the Social Sciences using appropriate methodologies.
- 2. The student will be able to demonstrate how culture, society, and diversity shape the role of the individual within society and human relations across cultures.

CREDIT HOUR DEFINITION:

To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic hours") of coursework per semester. For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of inclass coursework. Students enrolled in a three-credit history course at HCC can expect to spend

a total of 127.5 hours on coursework: 37.5 hours in class and, generally, ten hours preparing for exams, 35 hours completing course assignments, and 45 hours reading.

TOTAL HOURS OF COURSEWORK:

To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 37.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit. For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework.
