COURSE DESCRIPTION:*

From the catalog: This is a foundation course in sculpture in which students take a journey into the physical world of sculptural form, materials and processes. Students work with a variety of materials and explore techniques including modeling, carving, fabrication, and assemblage. The study of past and present artists helps students understand good form and composition, and the role of sculpture in our culture. Course fee required. Total of 60 hours of lecture.

From the Instructor: Students take a journey into the physical world of sculptural form, materials, and processes in this hands-on course. Students work with a variety of materials and explore techniques including modeling, casting, fabrication, and assemblage. The study of past and present artists helps students understand good form and the role of sculpture in our society.

- 4. Carve, model, and assemble materials into three-dimensional forms
- 5. Present sculptures in a professional manner in a final exhibit

COURSE TIME COMMITMENT

Total Hours of Coursework:

To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a **minimum** of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. This course is 3 credits, which equals 112+ hours of time for the semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom.
