COURSE DESCRIPTION:

From The Course Catalog: This course is designed for the student with basic drawing and painting skills and a desire to gain a solid understanding of portraiture. In a series of exercises emphasis will be placed on the skull-flesh relationship, major masses of the facial features, effects of light, facial expressions, gesture and hands in portraiture. The course will consist of a combination of PowerPoint presentations of master works, studio exercises working from the model and critiques of class work and weekly home assignments. Charcoal is recommended for the first two weeks, after which students will be free to work in other media including oils, acrylics, pastels or charcoal. Course fee required. Total of 60 hours of lecture.

TEXTBOOK:

Recommended, but not required – Dynamic Anatomy by Burne Hogarth Weekly assignment handouts will build a reference text.

COURSE CONTENT OBJECTIVES:

- 1. A working understanding of the anatomy of the head, facial features and the ability to apply this knowledge to create concrete portrait images.
- 2. Awareness of how movement of one facial muscle creates a chain reaction throughout the muscular structure of the face altering more than one feature and how use of this principle can be used to strengthen the impact of a work.
- **3.** A heightened sensitivity to the way light falls on an object and through this to understand how a three-dimensional mass can be translated into a two-dimensional representation.
- 4. An understanding of how gesture (body language) can be used to give deeper meaning to a sitter's inner life.
- 5. The ability to discern between relevant and irrelevant visual information—that can strengthen or weaken a work.
- 6. The ability to discuss and assess works knowledgably during class critiques of class and home exercises.

COURSE TIME COMMITMENT

Total Hours of Coursework:

To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a **minimum** of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. This course is 3 credits, which equals 112+ hours of time for the semester.
