COURSE DESCRIPTION:

From the catalog: This is an advanced course to help students develop a personal aesthetic in clay through construction techniques, surface treatments, and technical information. This class will have students pushing idea limits, refining skills, understanding the behavior of ceramic materials and processes, while creating an original and personal vocabulary in clay. Students will take an expanded approach to artistic issues of the medium, design elements and presentation of their work. Identifying and creating an independent artistic direction, and focusing their efforts accordingly, are the goals for the semester's body of work. Course fee required. Total of 60 hours of lecture.

COURSE CONTENT OBJECTIVES:

- 3. Refine ability to discuss contemporary ceramic art issues as exhibited in their own creations
- 4. Regular critiques will pay special attention to the crafting of form, surface, and thematic content. (# of works depends on scale and complexity of surface treatment)

Total Hours of Coursework:

To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 37.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of inclass coursework.
