COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is designed to provide an overview of the various dental specialties, including oral surgery, pediatric dentistry, endodontics, periodontics, prosthodontics and dental orthodontics. The study of each specialty includes definition of the specialty, conditions, laboratory techniques, instruments and materials used, pharmacology and the dental professional's role in each specialty.

#### **STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:

Be familiar with the drugs used in dentistry. Be able to identify drugs used for common medical conditions encountered routinely in dentistry.

Describe the role of the dental assistant in various specialties associated with dentistry.

List and describe various procedures and materials used in each specific specialty in dentistry.

Describe and contrast different specialty procedures and responsibilities of a dental assistant in the various specialty practice areas.

Identify and contrast instruments used in the various specialty areas in dentistry.

#### **GENERAL EDUCATION OUTCOMES:**

The student will be able to: Identify and list the different specialties in Dentistry

Identify and list the different instruments and medicaments used in these specialties.

Identify and list drugs used commonly in Dentistry and the reasons for their use.

Describe procedure differences in all the dental specialties.

## **COURSE POLICIES:**

**Total Hours of Coursework:** This is a three-credit, college-level course. To earn one academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 37.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 37.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework. You should expect to spend about <u>six hours per week outside of class</u> in order to succeed.
