COURSE: PSY 203 DATE: SP17

COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course surveys current psychological research and theory to address issues of teaching and learning. Instruction will focus on developmental theories, learn-ing theories, instructional approaches, motivation, classroom management, and other relevant topics. Students are required to participate in a 15-hour field experience in a local school. Prerequisite: EDU 101 and PSY 101

TEXTBOOK: Psychology Applied to Teaching, 14th ed., by Snowman & McCown

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Utilize the major theories, concepts, methods, and research findings of educational psychology to foster student success in the classroom.
- Understand how student diversity impacts on potential student learning outcomes.
- Appreciate the value of reflection on both theoretical knowledge and field experiences as a tool for professional development.

COURSE CONTENT OBJECTIVES:

At the conclusion of the course, the student will be able to:

- Understand the major theories of child and adolescent development (physical, social, cognitive, & moral) and how to utilize that understanding to foster learning
- Discuss student differences (cultural, intellectual, gender, socioeconomic, & disability) and their impact upon teaching and learning
- Define the major categories of exceptionalities and their impact on teaching and learning
- Describe the major theories of learning and motivation and how to employ them to create positive learning environments
- Recognize that there are different approaches to teaching that can be utilized to address student diversity
- Describe the role of the family in student learning and the teacher's role in creating a partnership with the family in order to maximize learning
- Identify effective classroom management techniques founded upon research and best practice
- Understand assessment and its role in the teaching/learning process
- Recognize and utilize valid sources of educational information
- Demonstrate the use of reflection as a professional development tool
