Opening Remarks Presented by:

Arlene F. Lee Executive Director Governor's Office for Children

Arlene F. Lee re-joins the Governor's Office for Children after a successful term at the National Academy of Sciences as the board director for the Committee on Law and Justice (CLAJ) where she worked to improve governmental decision making and public



policy and to promote the understanding and dissemination of research in matters involving law and justice. Prior to joining CLAJ, Ms. Lee was the Director of Policy at the Center for the Study of Social Policy, where she focused on helping federal and state elected officials develop research-informed policies and funding to improve results for children and families. In this capacity, she oversaw PolicyforResults.org, a leading national resource for results-based policy. Previously she was the Executive Director of the Governor's Office for Children from 2005 until 2007, where she chaired the Children's Cabinet and was responsible for administration of the Children's Cabinet Fund. She has served as the Deputy Director of the Georgetown University Center for Juvenile Justice Reform, Director of the Federal Resource Center for Children of Prisoners and Youth Strategies Manager for the Governor's Office of Crime Control and Prevention. Ms. Lee started her career as an attorney representing children and youth in the child welfare and juvenile justice systems, and became the first director of the Kent County Local Management Board. She is the author of numerous articles and co-authored The Impact of the Adoption and Safe Families Act on Children of Incarcerated Parents. She has a B.A. in Sociology from Washington College and a LD. from Washington College of Law, American University. As a result of her work, Arlene was named one of Maryland's Top 100 Women and has received three Governor's Citations.

Kurt Schwengel has been teaching Kindergarten in Santa Monica, Ca since 1995. He is also a national presenter for a variety of topics ranging from technology to creative teaching. He is an "NBC Crystal Apple" winner, eHow education expert,



Google Certified Teacher and SMUSD "Teacher of the Year". His Ted Talk "Occupy Kindergarten" has reached thousands of teachers across the country.

Kurt attended and played baseball for UCLA from 1988-93 earning a B.A. in Anthropology and went on to earn a Master's in Education and an M.B.A. from Pepperdine in 1995. And after Kindergarten gets out every day, Kurt is the head varsity baseball coach at Santa Monica High School.

In 1995, Kurt created his original Kindergarten curriculum, "Rock and Roll Kindergarten" and has traveled to almost every state in the country introducing his curriculum to over 20,000 teachers. In 2011 he began his grassroots movement "Occupy Kindergarten" in an effort to "bring the fun back to Kindergarten".

This session will review play and why children play the way they do- it's all developmental! Effective play based strategies, schedules, environmental tips will be shared, as well as ways to engage parents so they want to play too! Participants in this session will gain more information on: 1) Choosing developmentally appropriate toys. 2) "Setting the Stage" to play, creating a play-friendly environment. 3) Promoting play to build social skills- sharing, turn taking, and cooperation. 4) Transitioning between play opportunities- initiation, follow through, clean up, etc. 5) Expanding play so it's a new experience every time.



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
