COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course continues the study of the French language and reviews the four skills introduced in FRN 101. The methodology remains total immersion. Students are exposed to native speakers of French. Much attention is given to the study of the French culture. Students are encouraged to learn and speak from a French perspective.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The student will:

- Write a series of past and present narrative sentences in French and in a manner comprehensible to natives accustomed to the writing of non-natives.
- Speak and write French at a level of elementary 2 comprehensible to a sympathetic interlocutor who is accustomed to dealing with non-native French speakers.
 - Ask and answer questions on a variety of everyday topics, describe people and places, narrate recurring (present) events and gain the ability to narrate past events.
 - Discuss many daily activities, express likes and dislikes, discuss about past events, describe people and their personalities, and pronounce French with greater facility.
- Translate a range of authentic and pedagogically prepared texts in French for which they have been prepared through pre-reading activities.
- Translate French in uncomplicated and controlled contexts.
 - Understand most French spoken more slowly than normal pace, and some French spoken at normal pace.
 - o Derive basic meaning from TV broadcasts in French.
- Demonstrate a workable concept of cultural values and an increased cultural awareness, sensitivity, and recognition of French-speaking people.
 - o Demonstrate insights into their own culture and language.

GENERAL EDUCATION OUTCOMES:

- Evaluate important artistic, cultural, philosophical, historical, and religious movements from a global perspective.
- Understand the impact of diverse groups of people in and on the arts and humanities.

MINIMUM CLOCK HOURS REQUIRED FOR THIS COURSE

To earn one hour of academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 12.5 clock hours (15 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 12.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit. A three credit hour course requires 37.5 clock hours.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework.
