### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This course continues the study of the French language and reviews the four basic skills introduced in FRN 101 and FRN 102. Emphasis is placed on increasing the skills taught in the previous two sessions. Conversations and readings are longer and incorporate many idiomatic expressions. Students continue to study French culture and the methodology remains total immersion.

Prerequisite: FRN 102 or Level II of high school French or instructor consent.

## PROGRAM STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

The student will be able to:

- Demonstrate competency by engaging in conversations, providing and obtaining information, expressing feelings and emotions, and exchanging opinions.
  - Speak and write language comprehensible to a interlocutor who is accustomed to dealing with non-native speakers.
  - O Describe people and places, narrate recurring (present) events, express what they or others are going to do, narrate past events and talk about the future.
  - o Pronounce foreign language well.

  - o Restate some materials designed for the native speaker.
  - Interpret foreign language spoken slower than normal pace, understand a significant amount spoken at a normal pace, and begin to develop skills and coping strategies for filling in the gaps of imperfect comprehension.
  - o Derive a good deal of the meaning from TV broadcasts in foreign language.
- Compose in writing information, concepts, and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics.
  - Be able to meet a number of practical writing needs in foreign language and in a manner comprehensible to natives accustomed to the writing non-natives.
  - Write somewhat complex narrative sentences in foreign language using the following intermediate tenses

- Demonstrate a knowledge of foreign culture, its influence on attitudes, perspectives and worldview, and explain how these cultural elements compare and contrast with the student's own.
  - Apply high levels of cultural awareness, sensitivity, and appreciation of respective language-speaking people.
- Integrate understanding and insight into the nature of language.
- Integrate insights into their own culture and language.

- Evaluate important artistic, cultural, philosophical, historical, and religious movements from a global perspective.

To earn one hour of academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 12.5 clock hours (15 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 12.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit. A three credit hour course requires 37.5 clock hours.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework.
