ART 220 – Advanced Ceramics (3 credit hours) (replace this parenthetical with section number & Days/Times class meets)

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This is an advanced course to help students develop a personal aesthetic in clay through construction techniques, surface treatments, and technical information. This class will have students pushing idea limits, refining skills, understanding the behavior of ceramic materials and processes, while creating an original and personal vocabulary in clay. Students will take an expanded approach to artistic issues of the medium, design elements, and presentation of their work. Identifying and creating an independent artistic direction, and focusing their efforts accordingly, are the goals for the semester's body of work. Prerequisite: ART 120.

TEXTBOOK:

PROGRAM STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Student recognizes and applies the fundamental elements of art in a visual assignment.
 - Students create more advanced compositions in the media that build on the elemental tools of respective design.
 - Students develop more advanced compositions by applying these elements in a series of works.
- Student uses proper language concerning the materials and techniques appropriate to the medium
 - Students use terminology after advancing in the respective media they use in artmaking by instruction and experimentation.
- Student recognizes and differentiates the styles and mediums of important artists and historical movements.
 - Students analyze and compare leading artists in the medium and extract the lessons by comparatively evaluating style and technique.
- Student experiences creative challenges that develop critical thinking and problem solving.
 - Students add to their portfolio of works, continuing to address various techniques and compositional challenges.
 - Students demonstrate advancement through their expression of visual content in a series of works of art.
- Student will create and present a body of work created in individual study that demonstrates high level of skill, personal style, thematic discernment and understanding

of composition in a chosen medium.

• Students continue to build their final portfolio in chosen medium, adding to their accomplishments from their first class in the concentrated area.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Furthering the skills developed in ART 220, and with a focus on more complex and advanced techniques:

- Students will compose using hand building and wheel thrown techniques developed in a strong portfolio.
- Students will illustrate an expanding knowledge of scale, texture, content, glaze mixing, and color application through their work.
- Students will depict how to fire their own work in the kilns.
- Students will design and revise from weekly critiques that pay special attention to the crafting of form, surface, and thematic content. (# of works depends on scale and complexity of surface treatment).
- Students will demonstrate a progression of work for end-of-course review and public exhibition.

MINIMUM CLOCK HOURS REQUIRED FOR THIS COURSE

To earn one hour of academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 12.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 12.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit. A three credit hour course requires 37.5 clock hours.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework.
