COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course surveys the history of Western art from prehistoric times to the Renaissance through the study of painting, sculpture, architecture, and other arts. Special consideration is given to cultural factors which contribute to the rise of specific movements in art. Students are required to develop their critical ability and express their depth of knowledge through weekly writings on each period's works of art and cultural development. Readings, slides, and virtual tours enhance student understanding of traditional and contemporary art forms. Students are encouraged to attend the optional trip to the National Gallery each term.

Prerequisite: ENG 100 or placement into ENG 101.

 - O Students apply knowledge of traditional and contemporary techniques and media through written analysis of art to the historical periods of the Western Tradition.

COURSE STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Students will identify vocabulary and terms unique to 2- and 3-dimensional art forms.
- Students will recognize the works of notable artists and cultural styles in specific historical eras from prehistoric times to the Renaissance.
- Students will analyze and discuss skills that present universal human traits independent of advances in technical and scientific knowledge as expressed in works of art.
- Students will define and correctly use terms that reference styles, materials and processes of making art from prehistoric times to the Renaissance.
- Students will analyze aesthetic philosophies and apply these to judge and discuss art of

- the past, as well as contemporary art.
- Students will question the application of some traditional models of understanding history, such as learning that time and space are independent and may not apply to understanding the history of the arts.
- Students will discuss how art has influenced economic, political, cultural and religious systems, and concepts.
- Students will discern how the content and concepts contained within the art prior to the Renaissance are prevalent within modern western societies.
- Students will demonstrate specific information related to the arts of prehistory, Egypt, the Near East, Aegean, Greek, Etruscan, Roman, Early Christian, Byzantine, Romanesque, and Gothic art to Pre-Renaissance Italy.

GENERAL EDUCATION OUTCOMES:

This course may fulfill an Arts/Humanities General Education requirement. These are the outcomes for that requirement:

- Evaluate important artistic, cultural, philosophical, historical, and religious movements from a global perspective.
- Understand the impact of diverse groups of people in and on the arts and humanities.

MINIMUM CLOCK HOURS REQUIRED FOR THIS COURSE

To earn one hour of academic credit at HCC, students are required to complete a minimum of 12.5 clock hours (45 fifty-minute "academic" hours) of coursework per semester. Those hours of coursework may be completed through a combination of hours within the classroom and hours outside the classroom. Certain courses may require more than the 12.5 minimum hours of coursework per credit. A three credit hour course requires 37.5 clock hours.

For most classes, students should expect to do at least 2 hours of coursework outside of class for each hour of in-class coursework.
