


PRESIDENT'S REFLECTION

Wornden attended Williamsport High School and got started at HCC with in the Early College Access Program (formerly ES-SENCE). He attended HCC and graduated with an associate's degree in biology, with the vision that he would become a physical therapist or a chiropractor.

After his graduation, Wornden transferred to Stevenson, and af-

ter one semester (specifically while taking a chemistry class), he determined that science was not a passion of his. He then changed his major and graduated in 2019 with a bachelor's degree in business communications.

As a business communications major at Stevenson, he was required to work for the school newspaper and started taking and

editing photos. Eager to improve his photography skills, he enrolled in a photography class. The class required students to go out into the community to find clients from small businesses, free of charge. good central point for where I need to go. I want to help the community grow more and make Washington County bigger and greater every year"



Ed and Priscilla Sneckenberger of Hagerstown became local celebrities after their wedding in December 2022. Their unique love story has been shared by the Herald Mail, Echo-Pilot, and People.com - making Ed and Priscilla local celebrities.

Ed was originally from Greencastle and Priscilla was from Hagerstown. They were supposed to be married after Ed graduated from HJC in 1962, but the engagement ended when he went off to WVU. He earned bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees in mechanical engineering at WVU, where he taught for 36 years, while spending summers on "beautiful opportunities" at places like NASA, IBM, and the Environmental Protection Agency.

Ed was married to the former Scottie Hansbrough, also originally from Hagerstown, for 53 years until her death in October 2021. Priscilla was widowed after 23 years of marriage to Wally Matheny.

After Scottie died, Ed hoped to find Priscilla again. Ed, then living in Morgantown, WV, tracked down Pris-

cilla to apologize, with hopes of rekindling of the spark from six decades ago. Now that they have been reunited, the Sneckenbergers have been active in HCC alumni activities, most recently visiting the Washington County Playhouse with the HCC alumni.



HCC'S BIG READ: Walking to Listen

Hagerstown Community College is happy to announce its second annual Big Read initiative, open to all students, faculty, staff, and the community. The 2023 Big Read is Walking to Listen: 4,000 Miles Across America, One Story at a Time. The book is a memoir by Andrew Forsthoefel of his cross-country trektold through the stories of the people of all ages, races, and inclinations he meets along the highways of America.

At 23, Andrew Forsthoefel walked out the back door of his home in Chadds Ford, Pennsylvania, with a backpack, an audio recorder, his copies of Whitman and



Rilke, and a sign that read walking to listen. He had just graduated from Middlebury College and was ready to begin his adult life, but he didn't know how. So he decided he'd walk. And listen. It would be a cross-country quest for guidance, and everyone he met would be his guide.

Walking toward the Pacific, he faced an Appalachian winter and a Mojave summer. He met beasts inside: fear, loneliness, doubt. But he also encountered incredible kindness from strangers. Thousands shared their stories with him, sometimes confiding their prejudices, too. Often he didn't know how to respond. How to find unity in diversity? How to stay connected, even as fear works to tear us apart? He listened for answers to these questions, and to the existential questions every human must face, and began to find that the answer might be in listening itself.

Ultimately, it's the stories of others living all along the roads of America that carry this journey and sing out in a hopeful, heartfelt book about how a life is made, and how our nation defines itself at the most human level.

HCC will host a Big Read event with author Andrew Forsthoefel, on Thursday, March 23 at 10 a.m., in the Kepler Theater. Guests will get a closer look into Andrew's quest for guidance and the stories of others living along the roads of America. Bring your book to ask questions and get a free book signing.

HCC WINS CHAMBER AWARD

For the second year in a row, the college won big at the Washington County Chamber of Commerce's Annual Business Awards. Last year, college president Dr. James S. Klauber was named Business Person of the Year. This year, Hagerstown Community College was named Washington Coun-
