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# New Opportunities for **HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS**

Over the past five years, the Maryland legislature has grappled with a complete overhaul of its education system. Last year, the State began implementation of its new law called, The Blueprint for Maryland's Future, or "The Blueprint." This new law is all encompassing, making substantive changes in the K-12 education process in Maryland, all the way from pre-kindergarten to 12th grade. The Blueprint makes changes for high school students seeking dual credit opportunities with the 16 community colleges in Maryland, and HCC stands to see significant changes in the next year.

At the conclusion of a student's tenth grade year, they will receive an assessment to determine college and career readiness. This standard, called the CCR, will determine if students are ready to move on toward dual credit or career preparation courses. Students meeting the CCR standard will have the option of taking dual credit, Advanced Placement, or International Baccalaureate classes.

One of the most significant changes is that the Blueprint now requires all dual-credit courses to be offered free of charge to the student. Colleges will receive 75 percent of the tuition rate, and full reimbursement for books and fees from local education agencies. HCC has provided dual-credit opportunities both on its campus and in the high schools for many years. In the past, parents had to pay a lower tuition rate for students to access these

> courses. With the State requiring payment on the students' behalf, HCC expects to see significant growth in dual enrollment, both in the high schools and at the College.

#### **MOU** with WCPS

After a year of planning for these changes, HCC and WCPS recently executed a newly revised memorandum of understanding on dual enrollment implementation. The MOU requires faculty teaching in the high schools to be qualified by the Middle States Commission on Higher Education to teach college courses. Faculty must attend the same professional development delivered to full-time and

adjunct faculty at the College. Finally, college classes taught in the high school will no longer be split between students taking it for college credit and some taking the class for high school credit. This goal of uniformity will increase the quality of classes offered in the high school.



"My goal is for the quality of any class, regardless of teaching location, to be the same high quality that is offered here," said HCC President Jim Klauber.

As of this date, the College is already seeing growth in instructor to teach its CNA program at Boonsboro and Smithsburg. WCPS is in the process of outfitting two enrollment. #### **Career Training**

For the first time ever, HCC will offer career training courses in Smithsburg and Boonsboro High Schools. While Washington County Technical High School already offers a program in Certified Nursing Assistant, both WCPS and HCC see the strong need for CNAs in the health care field in Washington County.

HCC is currently searching for a full-time CNA

This program will be offered to high school juniors, and they should complete their training and certification by can finish their high school work, but also be placed as junior apprentices throughout the county's many participating health care agencies. After graduation from high school, these students will be prepared academically and experientially to go to work, and they can continue their training in one of many nursing and allied health careers with HCC if they so desire.

"It is all about creating opportunities for these students, and helping them see the vision for themselves," said Dr. Klauber. "We have to work together to provide them with a pathway of credentials that stack towards a degree, so that they can enter a career field and make satisfactory progression over their working lives."

Klauber hopes that if successful with CNA training, the two education partners can offer other career training in health care fields.

"I would like to work with WCPS on medical assistant and phlebotomy training. Both would give high school graduates great entry-level career opportunities and they could later come to HCC to pursue degrees in any of our health care fields."



# **HCC** ranks **NUMBER ONE** In **STUDENT** PERSISTENCE

Hagerstown Community College ranked number one of Maryland's 16 community colleges for the four-year successful-persister rate, based on the 2022 Performance Accountability Report from the Maryland Higher Education Commission. This represents a broad measure of persistence that captures the multiple ways students are displaying success at a community college.

HCC's top rate of 83.1 percent shows the percentage of students in a given cohort who have completed at least 30 credit hours with a grade point average of 2.00 or better, have graduated or transferred, or are still enrolled at HCC four years after their initial enrollment. This data is based on a group of students who started in the fall of 2017.

According to Dave Warner, HCC vice president of academic affairs and student services, significant efforts have been made in recent years to address the success of HCC students, especially those in developmental education courses. These are courses which are designed to develop the reading, writing, or math skills of students who have been assessed, through standardized tests, to be underprepared for college-level courses.

In the past, HCC, like most other schools, offered different developmental education classes for English and math, but the rates of success for those who were able to complete them and move to college-level courses were low.

"Several years ago, I became aware of a national movement to revise the developmental education courses into one course, through ALP, an accelerated learning program," said Warner. "We have been able to develop a single,

combined course that allows students to complete the developmental course work and the college-level coursework simultaneously, rather than having to do so over multiple semesters."

Warner stated that this approach has been most successful for the packaged English course, a single, six-credit course which combines developmental and college-level work into one course. For math students who need developmental education, HCC now offers two different levels of math courses – one that is algebra based for majors that require higher level math, and another that is non-algebra based, for majors that



HCC recently changed the requirements for placement testing of new students. In the past, all incoming students had to be tested for admission into college credit courses. Now, students who have a 3.0 GPA from high school are no longer required to take the standardized placement tests.

In addition to these curricular changes, officials at HCC recently redesigned the college advising model to focus more heavily on retention of current students. Emphasis has been placed on identifying and assisting students whose grades are suffering and who are missing class regularly.

"There are a number of factors that influence students' abilities to be successful in completing their educational goals," Warner said. "By identifying those at risk of dropping out, and offering assistance early and often, we can collectively help more students succeed."



# HCC Alumni Association develops NEW STRATEGIC PLAN

Members of the HCC Alumni Association executive committee recently met with HCC's dean of planning and institutional effectiveness, to discuss the Alumni Association strategic plan, which had not been updated since 2008. A strategic plan steering committee was formed and met every other week to lay the foundation for the plan, consulting with various stakeholders throughout the process. They unveiled the plan after four months of research and discussion.


The plan is organized around four strategic pathways to success, which include the following areas: alumni, students, the college, and the community. These pathways will be assessed over the course of three years. The strategies and tactics within each pathway will be monitored regularly and adjusted as needed.

The HCC Alumni Association is a group of dedicated HCC graduates and friends of the college who work to improve the educational experience at HCC and who enjoy networking with their fellow graduates. The association is served by a full-time coordinator of alumni relations and volunteer services and is led by a 13-member executive committee and a 42-member board of directors.

The mission of the Alumni Association is to foster relationships between alumni, current students, trustees, administration, and the community and convey a spirit of affiliation, tradition, and satisfaction in supporting HCC. Association members have numerous opportunities for involvement at HCC. They help recruit high-quality students, promote pride in the college, plan reunions and/or other social events, coordinate an annual golf tournament and the Flower & Garden Show to raise funds for the institution, and honor alumni and faculty for outstanding service. # HCC welcomed author ANDREW FORSTHOEFEL

Officials at HCC held the second annual Big Read in March, with Andrew Forsthoefel's book, "Walking to Listen: 4,000 Miles Across America, One Story at a Time."

Forsthoefel came to campus and met with more than 275 alumni, donors, faculty, staff, and students in several events over two days. He shared his reflections Ford, Pennsylvania, with a backpack, an audio from the memoir, which was written following his cross-country trek in search for guidance and stories of the people of all ages, races, and inclinations he met along the way.


"Andrew Forsthoefel did a masterful job connecting with not only our students, but with our alumni and donors as well," said HCC President Jim Klauber. "He spoke at two events on our campus and really gave a superb examination of Walking to Listen, that was appreciated by all."

Several faculty members used the memoir to integrate elements from it into their curricula. Many students

found Forsthoefel's story to be fascinating, which provided a relevant and meaningful way to engage them in their studies.

Forsthoefel's story began at the age of 23. He walked out the back door of his home in Chadds recorder, his copies of Whitman and Rilke, and a sign that read "Walking to Listen." He had just graduated from Middlebury College and was ready to begin his adult life, but he didn't know how. So, he decided he'd walk, and listen. It would be a cross-country quest for guidance, and everyone he met would be his guide.

In April, HCC President Jim Klauber held an event, "Walking with the President," along the C&O Canal. This provided interested students, faculty, and staff with an opportunity to walk and listen locally, if even for just one afternoon.




# **HCC** named Large Business of the Year

### **NEH Grant Concludes**



HCC's Bridging the Antietam grant completed its fourth and final year with a two-day institute on place-based learning. The November 2022 institute featured local storytellers, historians, faculty, and students presenting on different aspects of placebased learning.

Bridging the Antietam is a project funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and is designed to boost student performance in composition classes and produce curricula to support writing across the disciplines by focusing on memory and its constructions as expressed through the folklore, narratives, and interpretation of history of the Antietam Creek region (western Maryland, south central Pennsylvania, and eastern West Virginia) that HCC serves.

The project helps students improve thinking, reading, and writing skills, and engages faculty and the community in productive discussions related to local folklore and history. 
