What is the Administration of Justice program?

The Administration of Justice Program is the study of the system used by local, state, and federal government to maintain social control, enforce laws, and fairly and impartially manage decisions rendered by the courts. Students will learn about the interaction and relationship of the system's three major components: law enforcement, corrections, and the judiciary system.

Individuals hired to work within the criminal justice field may assume positions in a number of areas. In the area of law enforcement, graduates can pursue employment as a police officer, deputy sheriff, state trooper, natural resources officer, or special agent. In the field of corrections, graduates will find opportunities as correctional officers, probation and parole officers, and juvenile services representatives. Opportunities also exist in private security management and other protective services.

What is the employment outlook for this career field?

The U.S. Department of Labor projects continued growth in service occupations with an approximate five percent growth in the

protective service subgroup. Continued desire for public safety will result in a need for more officers, but employment will vary depending on location and is largely driven by local and state budgets.

Applicants with at least an associate degree and/ or law enforcement or military experience, as well as those who speak more than one language, will have the best job prospects.

Where do criminal justice professionals work?

Employment can be found at the local, state, and federal levels of law enforcement, corrections, and the judiciary system, as well as in both public and private security (*source: www.bls.gov/ooh*).

What do criminal justice professionals earn?

The starting salary depends upon employment with a local, county, or state agency. According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor and Statistics, the median annual wage for police and detective occupations in May 2017 was as follows:

- •\$62,960 Law Enforcement Officers
- •\$56,670 Fire Investigators
- •\$43,510 Correctional Officers
- •\$51,410 Probation and Parole Officers

Is a degree in criminal justice helpful for future employment?

Higher education has been shown to improve opportunities for obtaining a position or advancing in the criminal justice field. Many law enforcement agencies require a minimum number of credits or an associate degree for eligibility. Other agencies and private industry may require a bachelor's degree or an advanced degree for a particular position.

Why should I come to HCC?

HCC's Administration of Justice Program provides students with the education and training necessary to qualify for employment in the criminal justice field as well as a foundation to pursue further studies for career advancement.

HCC offers an associate of applied science (A.A.S.) degree, an associate of arts (A.A.)

degree in administration of justice for ease in later transferring to complete baccalaureate work.

Middle States Accreditation allows students to transfer their earned credits to another educational institution if they desire to continue academically.

A significant benefit to the HCC program is the experience and expertise of the faculty who, as current and previous practitioners within the criminal justice field, provide course instruction in the core criminal justice courses and help students to complete the program requirements.

A.A.S. Degree Administration of Justice

This curriculum is for students seeking an associate of applied science degree in law enforcement, corrections, or the judiciary system. With careful planning, it can be used as the basis for transfer to four-year degree programs.
